At the close of the paper the question as to where individual authorship came into our national poetry was discussed by the different members of the club present. The club adjourned at 8:30 without completing its business, in order to attend the lecture or Dr. Graham. The meeting will however be continued on Friday evening of this week, when the unfinished business of the previous meeting will be resumed.
