For the first time, we meet the University of Alabama in an athletic contest, in Birmingham, Ala., on next Monday, Nov. 19th.

The make up of their team, as given by the Sewance Purple, is as follows; Bankhead, 150, left end; Calahan, 162, left tackle: Davis, 168 left guard; Northington, centre; Pratt, 190, right guard; Simpson, 151, right tackle; Stone, 141, right end; Walker, 145, quarter-back; Burr, 132, left half-back; Goodwin, 130, right half-back; Abbott, 164, full-back. Average weight, 155 pounds, 3 less than the 'Varsity. Stone is captain, and Abbott, who is played on the team, very unamateurlike, is coach.
