THE SENIORS WIN.

Seniors vs. Sophomores 4--0.

The Senior and Sophomore football teams met for their final game Friday evening, and until the latter part of the second half it looked as if it was going to be a repetition of their former encounter.

The game was called 3 o'clock, the Sophs having the ball and facing the western goal. Shepherd kicks off and Lindsay catches the ball but fumbles and it goes back to '97.

The ball now goes from one side to the other on downs, and the whole of the first half is without interest, being marked by numerous fumbles and slow playing.

The only long runs were by Everett 15 yards Klutz 25 yards. Time is called with the ball on '97's 20 yard line.

SECOND HALF.

'97 takes the ball and Steele kicks off for 25 yards. Klutz T. catches it but is downed in his tracks. After two short rushes by the Sophs Nichols is hurt and Underhill substituted, and the ball goes over on 4 downs.

Steele then gains 12 yards and Lindsay 5, when the ball goes back to '97. The Sophs now take a brace: Haywood, Bailey and Shepherd each try the line for 2 yards, and then Haywood makes a pretty run of 15 yards around the end. Then follow three more short rushes and another 15 yard run by Haywood. After this they are forced to kick and '95 gets the ball.

Here they take their final brace and do the only good playing seen during the game.

Lindsay hits the line for 2 yards, and is followed by Weaver who goes through the line for a pretty run of 15, Lindsay then gains 2 more Steele 3, Lindsay 5, Steele 5, Lindsay 2 Steele 5, and then Lindsay dives through the line for a touchdown, Steele fails to kick goal.

Score, Seniors 4, Sophomores 0.

The ball is now returned to the center of the field and is kicked off by Shepherd. Myers catches and runs with it back for 5 yards. Only a few minutes of play are left and time is called with the Seniors still in possession and the ball at the center of the field. The game was free from any kicking against the decisions of the umpire and referee, but the quality of the playing was not equal to that seen in the Junior-Freshman game. Both teams were unparadonably slow, inattentive to signals and fumbled badly. For the Seniors, Lindsay and Steele made the best gains and Haywood for the Sophomores. Bailey who was hurt in the second rush played a plucky game throughout.
