Shakspeare Club Meeting.

The first meeting of the Club for this year was held in the Gerrard Hall, last Thursday night. The meeting was opened by a short introductory speech by the President, in which he reviewed briefly some of the work the Club had done in past years. This being the first meeting the election of officers for the ensuing year was the first business before the house, and Dr. Hume, to whose never-failing interest and untiring energy the success of the Club has been largely due, was unanimously elected to succeed himself as president of the Club. The other officers elected were: Dr. Ball, Vice-President; H. H. Horne, Secretary; J. W. Canada, Treasurer.

The first paper of the evening was read by Mr. Darden, his subject, Shakspeare's Autograph. He discussed the various spellings of the name, ending with the conclusion that Shakspeare was the authentic spelling. The second paper was by Mr. Burton Craige, on the "Sources and Materials in constructing Henry, the Fifth," in which he discussed the question of how far Shakspeare was original and how much influence by Hollingshead and others. The third paper was by Mr. W. C. Smith, on "Prince Hal, from the Tavern to the Throne," in which he showed the dramatic method of developing character, taking Prince Hal in the two parts of Henry the Fourth. The last paper of the evening was by Mr. J. C. Eller, on "Hal on the Throne," in which was a further treatment of the Prince's character.

The president pronounced the literary character of the work as above the usual standard, but there was one thing in regard to the meeting that we noticed with much regret, and that was the very poor reading of the papers. With hardly an exception the papers were poorly rendered, sometimes the reading was too fast and often so indistinct as to be hardly heard by the people at a distance from the reader. The papers were read as if they were not intended for the audience, and as if the reader was not familiar with what he was reading. There was little expression and the dramatic effect wholly lost. It is a great pity that the effect of such excellent work be lost upon the audience by poor reading, and we hope the next meeting will show an improvement in that direction.

The meeting was well attended, several of the ladies from the village honoring us with their presence and much interest is manifested in the work.
