The Association of Colleges and Preparatory Schools in the Southern States.

THERE was recently organized, in Atlanta, an "Association of Colleges and Preparatory Schools in Southern States." The institutions represented are: Vanderbilt University, University of North Carolina, Washington and Lee University, the Georgia School of Technology, Wofford College, Trinity College, Tulane University, Mercer College, University of Memphis, University of Alabama and University of Tennessee.

The Association is to meet annually the first week in November. The next meeting will be held in Nashville, Tennessee. The officers for the first year are: President, Geo. T. Winston, president of the University of North Carolina; Vice-presidents, Prof. Palmer, of Alabama and President Moreland, of Washington and Lee; Secretary and Treasurer, Chancellor, J. H. Kirkland, president of Vanderbilt University.

The organization of this association ought to mark a long step forward in education in the South. Two of the greatest difficulties that education in this section has had and has now, to contend with are: (1) the failure of the colleges to insist upon a certain standard of scholarship as an absolute prerequisite of admission; (2) the maintaining by the colleges of regularly organized preparatory departments. We do not mention here those colleges that profess to confine themselves to college work, and yet have their professors do preparatory work. So long as these conditions continue, anything like a good grade of scholarship will be impossible. College professors will continue to waste time and energy on men who ought to be in the preparatory schools; the preparatory schools will employ incompetent teachers because they are cheap. Why shouldn't they? Prepared or unprepared their pupils are going to be admitted to the colleges.

In view of these facts, the following conditions of membership in the Association is important: "As a pre-requisite to membership colleges must enforce a minimum of requirement in their entrance examinations. There a line of demarcation is strictly drawn between the institutions which do strictly collegiate work and those doing academic work and competing with academics and high schools."

Reference to the list of institutions composing the association will show that the most of the leading colleges and universities of the South are among them. There is no reason why the organization should not, within the next ten years, work a revolution in educational methods and in the standard of education of the South.

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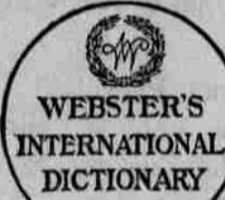
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
