An "All Southern" foot ball team has been chosen by "Whitper Casney" in *College Topics*. They are Penton and Kirkpatrick guards, Burlingame Va. center with Murphy N. C sub., Hicks Va. and Baird tackles, Price Va. and Mudd Va. or Merritt N. C., ends., Quarter back Taylor Va. with Barnard N. C. and Hoxton Va. close seconds, Lang Va., full back, with Connell substitute, Jones Va. and Stephens N. C. half backs,

This is no doubt interesting to some, especially Virginians. We doubt its correctness in many positions, for instances Baskerville and Connell are in our opinion as good full backs as any ever in a Virginia uniform.

Memorandum of an agreement, made this 13th. day of April, 1896, between the General Association of the University of Virginia, of the first part, and the University of North Carolina of the second part.

In future contests between the respective foot ball and base ball teams of the said Universities, the eligibility of the players shall be determined by the following rules.

(1). No player shall be eligible in such contests unless he be at the time a bona fide matriculated student of that institution upon whose team he proposes to play.

(2). Nor shall any player be eligible who is receiving, or who has received, at any time, compensation or the promise thereof, from any source or any character, directly or indirectly, for athletic services.

(3). This agreement to remain in force for a period of three (3) years from this date, and for such further period as may be agreed upon.

(4). That lists of the men from which the team are to be selected shall be exchanged three weeks before any game, and that any objection which may be raised as to any of the players shall be submitted in writing to both Advisory Committees two weeks before the game and must be passed upon one week before the game.

The officials of the above named,

including managers and captains, shall endeavor in good faith, to uphold and carry out this agreement, according to the spirit and the true intent and meaning thereof, in furtherance of the avowed purpose on the part of each of said associations, to eliminate every trace of professionalism from their athletic contests.
