**Some Statistics.**

Below are found some statistics made out from the season's record of ten games. Six of the team played in all the games, seven have a batting record of over 300 and two have a perfect fielding average.

**Stanley.** Ten games, forty-six times at bat, twenty-nine hits, batting average .630, scored twenty-one runs, had fifty-nine chances, made eight errors, fielding average .837, has gotten six bases on balls and stolen fifteen bases.

**Winston.** Ten games, forty-six times at bat, nineteen hits, batting average .430, scored twenty-one runs, had eighty-six chances, made six errors, fielding average .930, has gotten three bases on balls and stolen four bases.

**Gregory.** Ten games, forty-four times at bat, eighteen hits, batting average .408, scored sixteen runs, had sixty-seven chances, made five errors, fielding average .925, has gotten seven bases on balls and stolen nine bases.

**Bailey.** Ten games, forty-three times at bat, sixteen hits, batting average .374, scored sixteen runs, had fifteen chances, made three errors, fielding average .950, has gotten five bases on balls and stolen eleven bases.

**Johnson.** Ten games, forty-five times at bat, thirteen hits, batting average .288, scored eleven runs, had fifty chances, made twelve errors, fielding average .760, has gotten

ten four bases on balls and stolen four bases.

**Graham.** Ten games, thirty-eight times at bat, fifteen hits, batting average .394, scored ten runs, had nineteen chances, made six errors, fielding average .684, has gotten six bases on balls and stolen eight bases.

**Whitaker.** Eight games, thirty-four times at bat, nine hits, batting average .264, scored eleven runs, had twelve chances, made one error, fielding average .916, has gotten one base on balls and stolen four bases.

**Brem.** Four games, sixteen times at bat, four hits, batting average .250, scored five runs, had ten chances, made one error, fielding average .900, has gotten one base on balls and stolen four bases.

**Stephens.** Seven games, twenty-four times at bat, six hits, batting average .250, scored seven runs, had twenty chances, made six errors, fielding average .700, has gotten two bases on balls and stolen three bases.

**Hills.** Seven games, twenty times at bat, six hits, batting average .300, scored five runs, had twenty-two chances, made two errors, fielding average .909, has gotten one base on balls and stolen three bases.

**Pearsall.** Six games, thirteen times at bat, four hits, batting average .307, scored five runs, had thirteen chances, made no errors, fielding average 1000, has gotten five bases on balls and stolen three bases.

**Belden.** Five games, fifteen times at bat, two hits, batting average .133, scored two runs, had five chances, made no errors, fielding average 1000, has gotten one base on balls and stolen one base.

The team has stolen 69 bases, made 122 runs, 141 hits, 50 errors, earned 59 runs, has a batting average of .336 and a fielding average of .876.

Our opponents have stolen 40 bases, made 71 runs, 80 hits, 60 errors and earned 22 runs.
