**The Gymnasium.**

While for several years regular work in the gymnasium has been required of the three junior classes, for the most part, the boys have not seemed to take kindly to the idea and have shown a disposition to shirk the duty. This may have been due in part to a feeling that the equipment of the gymnasium and the quality of the work were not all that they ought to be, the instructor being only a fellow student. But principally it was because the mass of students had not caught the real spirit which underlies the athletic tendencies of the times. Now, people everywhere are beginning to recognize the fact that a man who is lacking in either of the three sides of his nature, viz. the physical, the mental or the moral, lacks just so much of being a man in the fullest sense.

The pale, listless student with a distant, abstracted gaze is no longer the ideal type of intelligence and scholarship. The vigorous, healthful body with every member trained and skilled to perfect obedience to an equally vigorous and healthful mind, is what men strive to develop now.

Something of this idea is beginning to permeate the minds of students, and the result is an increased interest in physical exercise. To encourage this interest and give men adequate means to develop themselves, the University is adding more apparatus to the gymnasium and has employed an efficient instructor. They have been fortunate in securing Prof. H. E. Mechling, a graduate, and for three years instructor, in the International Training School of Christian Workers. Prof. Mechling will devote himself entirely to this department. He will begin next week to take the measurements and make a physical diagnosis of every student in the University, prescribing the kind of work best suited to each individual.

This means more work, better work and better results than have ever been produced before.
