Baseball.

The baseball players are showing steady improvement, and are now in far better form than this time last year. Judging from their work, Carolina need have no fear that the team of '97 will fail to be a "winner." We have now five pitchers, Mangum, Williams, Hines, Tate and Hayes, and all are doing well. From present prospects, it seems that we are going to have much better batting than ever before, which alone is great cause for encouragement, as a well placed hit is often the means of winning the game.

The schedule of games is especially good, and there is no reason why we should not have a very successful season.

The two first games are with Oak Ridge and the Presbyterian High School, two "snappy" preparatory school teams, which will give our team good practice before meeting Virginia a few days later.

We play Wake Forest for the first time in several years, and also have two new baseball opponents in the University of Pennsylvania and the University of Georgia, having two games with each.

We also meet Lafayette and Lehigh twice, three of these four games being played on the home grounds. During the past three years we have played six games with Lafayette, winning three, and five with Lehigh, winning all.

Yale evidently intends to avenge herself on the Tar Heels, who had the audacity to defeat "Old Eli" last year, and Princeton is hoping to have a picnic with them, although the Tigers just managed to win a victory by a narrow margin at our last meeting. As for Virginia, well, we must at least have two of the three games, and the "lusty little Chanticleer," as *College Topics* kindly called us, will crow for the championship of '97 with as good will as it did for '96 on a certain day last April.
