Tappan Adney, 1880-81, artist, hunter, and writer, has been sent to the Klondike by Harpers Weekly.

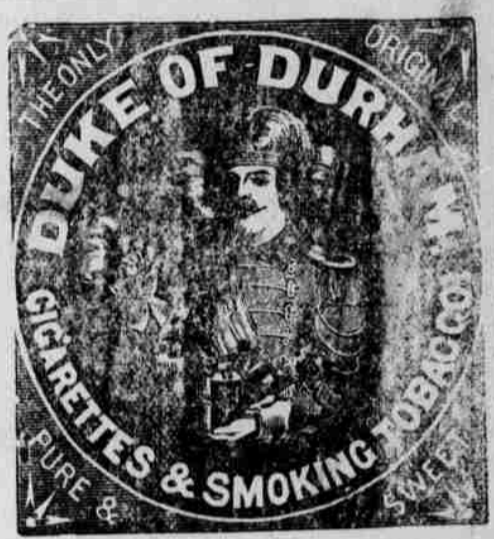
