Carney 2, Pierce 2 yds, then 3 yds. Ball is now on Carolina's 10 yd. line. Buxton takes Graves' place at left half back. Carolina makes a stand. Pierce and Carney each fail to gain but on third down Pierce makes the required 5 yds. Hill makes 4 yds and Carney carries the ball over for a touch down. Templeman kicks goal.

### The Meds. Champions for '97. The Class Series Ended.

The final game for the championship has been played and the palm of victory belongs to the Meds. On Wednesday last they defeated the Fresh, by the wide margin of 22-6. The crowd was large, the day fine and from start to finish the playing was fast and furious.
