Proceeding to the regular program the first paper of the evening was read by Dr. F.P. Venable upon "National Science as Interpreted by Societies". Therefore that to Lucretius Homer was the greatest of poets because he entered down into the truth of nature more than any other poet and although no great originality of praise in the poem of Lucretius, yet his intense enthusiasm for his master. SOUTHERN Homer makes the poem interesting. Contrary to the method of modern theorists Lucretius first announced his theory and then proposed to make it fit to facts. Lucretius' theory as to the three physical stakes was briefly taken up and commented upon. In this theory it was held that solids are made up of atoms hooked together, The direct line to all points. liquids are composed of racend atoms and finally gasses are held together by sharp atoms.
