The first meeting of the Elisha Mitchell Scientific Society for this year was held in the chemical lecture room on last Thursday evening. The officers for the ensuing year, chosen at a special business meeting of the society were announced as follows.

Before proceeding with the set program for the evening a report by Dr. Venable upon the Exchanges of the society was read and listened to with much interest by those present. In this report it was found that the society's Journal has no less than 314 exchange among them being scientific publications from many foreign countries.

Proceeding to the regular program the first paper of the evening was read by Dr. F. P. Venable upon "National Science as Interpreted by Societies". In the outset it was stated that the wars of Lucretius was intended to explain to the minds of men the true nature of things we find. Therefore that to Lucretius Homer was the greatest of poets because he entered down into the truth of nature more than any other poet and although no great originality of praise in the poem of Lucretius, yet his intense enthusiasm for his master. Homer makes the poem interesting. Contrary to the method of modern theorists Lucretius first announced his theory and then proposed to make it fit to facts. Lucretius' theory as to the three physical states was briefly taken up and commented upon. In this theory it was held that solids are made up of atoms hooked together, liquids are composed of racend atoms and finally gasses are held together by sharp atoms.

Tennyson's severe criticism of Lucretius, declaring him to be a mad man etc, was shown to be unjust in that he failed to catch the spirit of the poem, and the idea that Lucretius was crazy was shown to have arisen probably from the fact that he was unintelligible to many. In conclusion Dr. Venable said that we must take into consideration the superstitions of the times in which Lucretius lived and give the fact full credit for the efforts he mad to free men from such.

The next and last paper of the evening was by Mr. T. G. Pearson on "Some notes on some of the Colony Breeding Birds of Eastern Carolina". In this paper a minute description of the habits, character and mode of living of some of the most noted birds to be found on the coast of Eastern Carolina, was taken up at length and thoroughly enjoyed by those present.

The hour for the meeting being all ready consumed the meeting was declared adjourned by the president.
