

**What Coach Reynolds says about the game.**

Carolina six Virginia two tells the story better than any other words. Two strong teams, well matched with the stronger team winning. 'Tis true much of the game was played in Carolina's territory, but that does not necessarily mean that Virginia was superior. The reasons were these;— In the first half Virginia had a heavy wind at her back and by the aid of good punting kept the fight from her goal nearly the whole of the first half. She had three opportunities to score but failed to rise to the occasion. Carolina's defense was too perfect and stubborn for Virginia to force her back after she had secured the ball near Carolina's goal. In the latter part of the first half Carolina began to show her superiority. When she started from her 7 yard line and by the aid of a punt and a fumble of Virginia she smashed Virginia's line and circled her ends until at the close of the half it was Carolina's ball on Virginia's 25 yard line.

In the second half Carolina by three bad passes of the center and the line breaking through on kicks lost enough ground to cause thereby the whole of the second half to be played in her territory. Carolina opened on Virginia from her 40 yard line and by means of a few short gains through the line, a quarter back kick and one or two sprints by Howell terminating in that magnificent run for a touch down that won the game. Then came the Virginia brace. It was a magnificent effort. With the guards back formation she steadily pushed Carolina back to her ten yard line when Carolina by a desperate stand stopped Virginia's terrific rushes and saved the day. The ball was again kicked out of danger and once more Virginia started but was soon thrown back for such large losses that she tried a goal from field. Rogers, not wishing to take any chances on Virginia's capturing a fumbled ball, caught it on the fly rather than permitting it to bound, and was thrown over the line for a safety thus permitting Virginia to score two points, but taking away all chances of her winning the game.

During the whole game each side was on the defensive. Neither team was able to make much ground through their opponets with the exception of two rallies by each team. Probably the best criticism of the game that I could make is the one that Arthur Poe, Referee, gave me after the game. The best team won.

Carolina had the stronger backs and Virginia the stronger line. Carolina started quicker and played better together than did Virginia. She handled kicks better and made up what she lost on punting by her better catching of kicks & running them back while Carolina ends and line men held all the distance that she punted. And lastly Carolina's team was better handled on the whole."
