Exchanges.

The Georgia Oratorical Association met in Atlanta Jan. 23, to discuss unfinished business of the Association. After much discussion the following amendment was made to the Constitution. "No student shall be eligible to compete in any contest of the Association, who has filled professional places among adult men, viz: To have appeared upon the lecture platform for compensation, to have plead a law case before a justice or adult jury for money, or to have filled the pulpit for any length of time preaching for remuneration."

This announcement means that Georgia will win next time. College boys are not supposed to compete with licensed lawyers and preachers. If this amendment had been in force during the last contest Mr. Adair would have carried back to Athens the palm of victory he justly deserved.

Seventy men responded to a call for foot-ball candidates for next Fall's team at Harvard.

The Harvard-Pennsylvania foot-ball game will be played next year in Philadelphia on November 4th.

The Legislature of Maryland has appropriated for the use of John Hopkins University the sum of \$50,000 a year for two years, without conditions.

Yale plays Princeton in football next fall on November 18th and Harvard will probably be played on the 11th of the same month.

Alpha Theta Phi.

In 1894 a society by the name of Alpha Theta Phi was founded here by Prof. H. C. Tolman, Ph. D., now Professor of Greek in Vanderbilt University. Its purpose was "to stimulate and increase a desire for sound scholarship in the University" and up to this year it has been carried on with some success. Those eligible to this society are Juniors who have attained the average of ninety per cent in their classes up to Christmas of their Junior year and Seniors who failed in their Junior year may be taken in their Senior year if their June examinations brought them up to that average. The present Junior class has four or five men who are eligible to this society and it is nothing but right that they should have advantage of the society for there is some honor to belong to it. The officers of last year never looked up the standing of the class of '99 and consequently nothing has been done this year. Last year's President is an instructor in the University and we hope he will look into the matter and help to bring the society on a sound basis again. If the officers for the year are ascertained we are sure that steps will be taken to accomplish such. Let the proper authorities take hold of this matter.
