This part of the program, he said, was the most inspiring part of the commencement exercises at the great Northern Colleges. We hope that his efforts in this direction will be successful. He also urged on the Class the importance of Senior Day and hoped that the class would give its hearty co-operation in making that day the most enjoyable of the commencement.

Let each Senior give his aid in making the day popular and thus attract visitors here on Tuesday of commencement week.
