The Shakespeare Club.

The Shakespeare club was organized in 1885 by Dr. Thomas Hume, who had a few months before been elected Professor of English Language and Literature in the University. Messrs. Lucius McGee, Robt. Grissom, Steven B. Weeks, Wm. J. Battle and others were prominent in its establishment. From the first the union of method and enthusiasm were observed in its work and its exercises were largely attended. Robt. Grissom gave to it unstintingly and helped to form the nucleus of its library, which has since received many valuable additions so that now in the Shakespeare seminary the student is well befriended. St. Clair Hesser in his turn created mirth by his satirical sketches of Shakespeare's women. Many others, whose names now shed lustre on their *alma mater*, cultivated literature here on the Shakespeare club and a little oatmeal. Many teachers in other institutions have written to inquire into the secret of its marvellous success and the answer is, the personality of our Professor of English, scientific class work as a foundation, individual dealing with those who develop talent and a re-handling of their work for the meetings of the club.

The first meeting of the year is to be held in the chapel on Monday evening at 7.15, when interesting and valuable papers will be presented as follows:

"Shakespeare's Methods of Using the Old Chronicles," by N. C. Curtis.

"Reflections of Old English Life in the Henry play," by Mr. A. A. Holmes.

"The Old Play 'The Famous Victories of Henry V' and its Relation to the Shakespeare Plays," by Miss Stonegard.

Mr. M. G. will also give special studies in expression, taking Richard III as a basis.

All are invited to come out and enjoy this delightful programme.

Marvin Pickard Dead.

At 6:30 o'clock yesterday evening, Mr. Marvin Pickard, who has been sick with typhoid fever for some weeks, succumbed to the fatal disease, and passed from time to eternity. Mr. Pickard entered the University with the class of 1900, and had consequently been for three years a student here. He was a young man liked by all who knew him, and had numerous friends who are deeply grieved over his untimely death. Mr. Pickard was selected to manage Commons Hall this year by the Faculty Committee because of the hotel-managing ability he had displayed in helping his father, Mr. W. W. Pickard, manage his hotel, but owing to his illness, was never able to take charge. The bereaved family have the deep sympathy of the students.

At 2:30 o'clock p.m. today the Senior Class, of which Mr. Pickard was an ex-member, met in the chapel and passed the following resolutions:

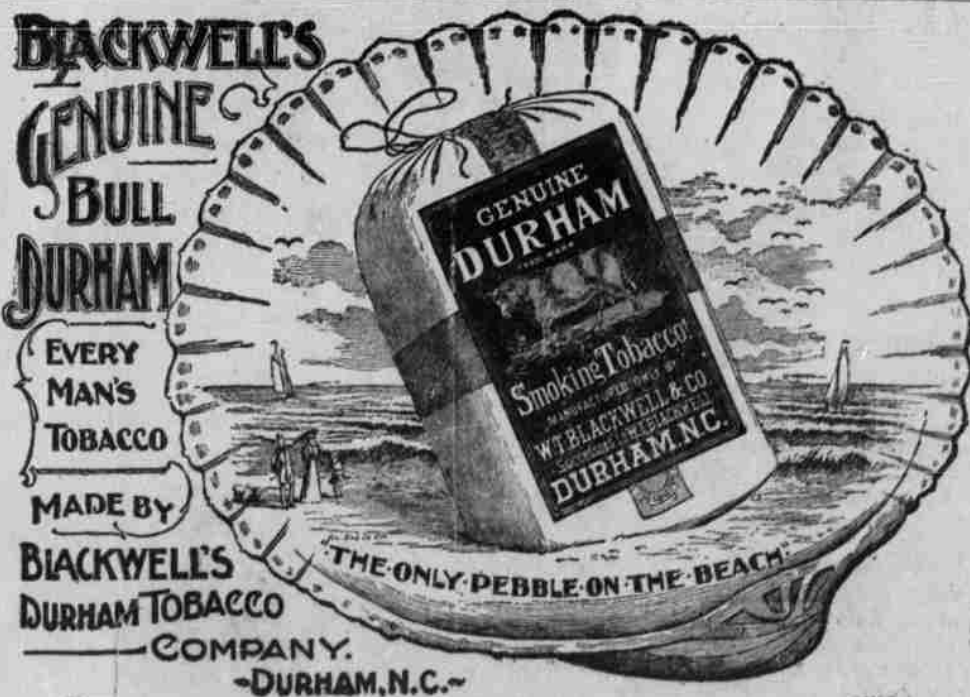
