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A Protest.

It is a disagreeable thing to have to have to be always offering complaints but it seems to the writer of this that a remonstrance against a rule made some time ago would not be out of place.

The following regulation was announced: "If any student misses prayers as many as twelve times during the present half term he will not be given the grade of *one*, even if he earns it by his paper and term standing." In talks made before the student body, particular emphasis is laid on the statement that at this University students are treated as men. But if this arbitrary rule is a fair sample of the treatment shown students, there seems to be a marked case of not "practicing what is preached."

If by hard work throughout the term and during the final test of examinations a man earns the coveted word *one* the authorities have no just right to take it away from him simply because he slept a little late on a few mornings. The missing of the chapel exercises has absolutely no connection with the recitations and such a "prep" school rule seems to show more than anything else a desire to use questionable authority. There is certainly no element of justice in it.

Besides, even if the rule were just, it would not cause to be attained the object for which it was made. The fellows who miss prayers most often are not those who earn *ones* but the lazy fellows who are delighted with a *four*.

These are not in the least affected by this rule. So that this regulation will not materially improve chapel attendance, while it will work hardship and injustice on the best men in college.

Surely the authorities will not allow such a rule to stand. Punish sleepiness (if that be a crime) in some other way, but don't take away from us what honor we justly earn, on account of a few naps.

Although the writer of this is not effected by this rule, yet he wishes to see the lower classes have fair treatment.

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
