Graves kicks 35 yds and Osborne downs the man in his tracks. Freyer tries over tackle for 5 yds. Wade goes through ten yds. Gamon masses on tackle for 6 yds. Freyer quick opening for 15 yds. Martin getting in a beautiful tackle. Wade goes through for 3 yds. and again 4. Freyer goes over tackle for 4 yds. Wade tries through center but fumbles and Martin gets ball on Carolina's 10 yd. line. McRae tries twice over tackle for 1 yd. and is hurt. Bellamy takes his place. Graves kicks but is worn out, the ball goes high in air and forward only 5 yds. Freyer skirts end for 3 yds. and Gamon goes around end for 9 yds. Wade goes over center for 2 yds., guards back formation being now used. Wade scores a touchdown.

Wortman kicks goal.

Time 14 minutes.

Graves kicks 40 yds. and Gamon goes down the field for a 45 yd. run. Gamon makes 1 yd. Freyer goes around end for 2 yds. Gamon on mass on tackle for 10 yds. and Nichols makes 1 yd. On double pass Annapolis makes 3 yds.

Berrier hurt and Weaver goes in. Richardson takes Graves' place. Freyer makes 4 yards on mass play and Nichols goes around tackle for 4 yards. 2 minutes and 45 seconds to play and ball on 20 yard line. Nichols tries same play for 5 yards gain. Gamon tries tackle with no gain. Freyer makes 4 yards on quick opening. Carolina holds in line and Annapolis gets 5 yards. Freyer goes through quick opening for 3 yards and again for 2 yards. Ball on Carolina's 1 yard line. Holligan goes through opening on guards back formation for a touchdown. Score N. A. 12, N. C. 0. Time 5 minutes and 45 seconds. Wortman kicks goal.
