#### Book Table-talk.

The current Nation presents an interesting discussion of the "College Leisure Class" contrasting the present with the past in the composition of student-bodies. vsis of statistics shows an increasing number of students from the cities and larger towns, -A class of students, says the writer, who come to college not because they hunger for knowledge but because they have the financial resources and covet the social distinction of a degree. \*\*\* The rough and brutal practices of a generation ago have disappeared but their place has been taken by practices which while seemingly more refined are in reality more pernicious, arising from the ease and indolence that wealth naturally promotes.

We do not imagine that the collection of stories called "Vassar Studies" and purporting to reveal the life of that great school for women will in any sense cause a sensation in the college world. It is too weak a thing to represent the life of the place or make an impression on collegiate literature. There is a great deal of this: "Most of my college friends were the sweetest things-We had two of the dearest rooms opening into each other with four large windows in the larger. That was mine, absolutely darlingembroidered pillows," etc. These descriptions mixed with a quantity of academic philosophy give a substance of about the consistency of molasses and milk.

The team was given credit for playing "a strong, plucky game under very disadvantageous circumstances"; for "making Princeton work hard for every point she scored", and for many other qualities that give us pride.
