high hurdle was fairly well run by Curtis, McIver, and Simpson. Simpson was unfortunate in getting a bad fall.

Osborne's time on the two hundred and twenty yards dash was slow. He was closely followed by Gudger, who ran well considering that it was a new race to him.

Curtis and McIver did very satisfactory work on the two hundred and twenty yards low hurdle and are showing up in good shape. Both are capable of better speed. In form and speed Curtis leads. Simpson was disabled from his fall and was not at his best. Osborne's time was very little better than Simpson's.

Berkeley finished first in the mile run.

Croswell's jumping was good and he is improving.

Hearne and Alexander were unwell and could not enter. Both of them are long distance runners and were missed in the mile and quarter of a mile runs. Oldham, Lawson, Foust and Allison have been kept on the ball field and could not enter the practice.

The training by Stafford, Ballard Gant, Lynch, Clement and Makely has been very irregular. Some candidates have never been on the field at all and could not be called candidates except for the fact that they thus designated themselves when their names were entered on the list of possible entries.

Rankin, Elliott and Roberts are continuing their work with the hammer and shot. Oldham, Croswell and Drane high jump and Linville and Burgess are improving their pole vaulting.

Public Lectures.

The members of the University and the people of the village are destined to literary treats within the next week. On Thursday the fifteenth, Dr. Chas. S. Mangum will deliver a lecture on "The Warfare of Man with Bacteria." Saturday evening Mr. L. C. Van Noppen, an old University student who has won distinction in the world of letters, will deliver an address on the "History of South Africa" with particular reference to the Boers and the war they are now carrying on against Great Britain. Mr. Van Noppen is of the same stock as these sturdy defenders of their liberty and privileges and is extremely well posted on his subject.

On Monday night Dr. J. William Jones will deliver his address on the "Contributions of the South to American History." Dr. Jones is too well known to require any words of introduction. For three years and a half he served as chaplain to the devoted Army of Northern Virginia and was thus thrown into most intimate contact with many of the makers of American History, our Confederate leaders. Dr. Jones has also served for a long time as chaplain to the University of Virginia. During the coming week he will officiate as University Preacher. He will stay with Dr. Hume to whose efforts is in a large measure due his visit to us.
