Shakespeare Club Meets.

The regular monthly meeting of the Shakespeare Club was held in Ferrard Hall last Tuesday night. The meeting was presided over by Dr. Hume and the programme was unusually interesting one. The president made a few remarks on good text-books for use in the study of Shakespeare. Among those mentioned were Dowden's Primer Shakespeare, Lee's Life of Shakespeare, and Spencer Baynes' Shakespeare. The Rolfe, Hudson and Arden are the best annotated editions and the Globe edition is a correct and useful complete work in one volume.

As a prelude to the regular exercises, Mr. Jas. K. Hall read a valuable paper on "Juvenal as compared with Modern Satirists." The metre is essentially Roman. Condition of affairs in Juvenal's time is especially favorable to satirical writing.

He was a great word-painter and his words are always accurate. He never writes the abstract but always the concrete. He was in some respects like Milton and in others like Pope. Juvenal differed from all modern satirists in that he never wrote anything personal. He was a moral teacher and the prophet of his age.

The next paper was also an excellent one. It was on "Desdemona" and was read by Mr. P. H. Key. Shakespeare was in his best power when he wrote "Othello." Macaulay said it was the greatest work in the world. The general trend of the character of Desdemona is shown in her name which means "ill starred or fated." She is the only one of Shakespeare's characters that are not capable and resourceful. The character is defective in two respects: 1 Lack of intellectual perception, 2 It is contradictory. It seems as if we should consider her weakness at the end of the play with her strength at the beginning we would dim, in a measure, the flash of dramatic villainy.

The next paper was to have been read by Mr. Wharton, but owing to his sickness, Dr. Hume closed the evening's programme with an excellent paper on "How Hamlet looked." Hamlet was young, frank in grace and charm of manner. He was a skilled swordsman. At Ophelias' funeral, he leaps in the grave, thus proving his physical fearlessness. In person he must have had the pensive grace of Philip Sydney, with sometimes the fire of Raleigh.

After still further discussion and after other personalities of the evening, the meeting was adjourned.

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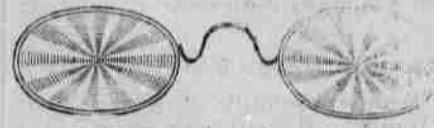
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
