Dr. Alderman Talks.

Lost Thursday at the last half of the last morning hour, Dr. Alderman spoke to the students on matters of college interest. He said that the two greatest changes in college life for the past few years had been the introduction of the elective system and the introduction of athletics. He spoke of the value of athletics and said that the time has arrived for the University to take its stand for absolute purity and cleanliness in athletic life. To make a stand we must first define professionalism.

Never again will our team play against any team that has the slightest taint of professionalism about it.

He spoke of the Summer Session of the University. It will begin about the 16th of June and end about the 12th of September.

The studies and arrangements were described and other features were spoken of.
