Track Meet of Preparatory Schools

Six schools have given verbal consent to enter the Prep Track Meet which is to be held here Friday, April 28th. We are glad to note the growth of track and field athletics among the schools. The meet this year is the largest ever held in the State. The teams will number from five to 20 men, and it is easy to see that the contest will be spirited.

The officials for the day have not yet been appointed. They will be drawn from the student body and the faculty of the University.

The regular order of events is as follows:

- 1 50 yards dash
- 2 Putting 12 lb. shot
- 3 100 yards dash
- 4 Throwing 12lb. hammer
- 5 330 yards low hurdle
- 6 Running high jump
- 7 Running broad jump
- 8 Pole vault
- 9 Kicking football for distance
- 10 Kicking football for goal
- 11 Throwing baseball for distance.
- 12 Relay race (four men from each team.)

The prizes offered are:

- A silver cup to the champion athlete;
- Asilk banner to the champion school;
- A white and blue rosette for the first place; a blue ribbon for second place; and a white ribbon for third place.

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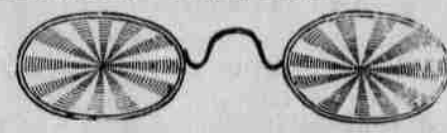
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
