

TAR HEELS VICTORIOUS.

Mr. Klutz in his rejoinder devoted some time to the protectorate proposed by Mr. Crooks, saying that it would require native rulers and would only be pandering to the schemes of Aguinaldo and his followers. History shows, he said that protectorates end in annexation and as for doing with the Philippines as with Cuba no one doubts that Cuba will one day come under the American flag. Mr. Klutz maintained that any idea of morality that demanded the relinquishment of the Philippines was unethical and narrow, and that the United States could not do otherwise, and do its duty, than carry the best of Anglo-Saxon civilization to these people who have fallen into her possession by the fortunes of war.

Mr. Monk in his rebuttal referred to the supposed inconsistency in the argument of the affirmative pointed out by Mr. Bernard, namely that the Filipinos were not fit to become a part of the United States but capable of independence. Mr. Monk said the affirmative's position was the Filipinos, though not yet fit for self-government, would be in time, but fitness to govern themselves, according to their ideas, he said, did not necessarily imply fitness to take part in American government which was higher and more developed. Mr. Monk devoted the remainder of his rejoinder to answering the commercial and strategical argument advanced by the negative. He took the position that all the trade which would come to the United States by permanent possession of the Islands had been secured by a guarantee of the open door policy, and the retention and fortification of a single island, as Luzon, would be sufficient to maintain this policy and of more help in time of war than the possession of the islands.

Mr. Bernard who closed the debate said the negative's position involved three principles, first, retention is expedient; second, continuity of policy demands it and, third, God and humanity demand it. Mr. Bernard explained also that Christian possession meant that the possessed was an organic part of the possessor, as the hand is a part of the body. It is foolish, he said, to say we can not govern the Philippines without their consent—might as well say we cannot do good to people without their wanting it. As for right to govern people being derived from the consent of the governed, Mr. Bernard said that meant the consent of people capable of giving consent. Mr. Bernard closed the debate and his speech by speaking of the selfishness and isolation and by pressing home the duty of expansion.

During the interim while the judges were making up their decisions, Mr. Klutz stepped forward and in a few chosen words thanked the University and the city of Nashville for the cordial welcome extended to the Carolina debaters.

The judges who were Mr. Hamilton Parks, Dr. J. Y. Crawford, and Prof. H. A. Vance, rendered their decision in favor of the negative, and North Carolina had won.

The next of this series of debate will be held in Chapel Hill, North Carolina.

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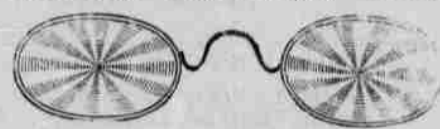
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
