The Johnston County Club of the University has recently established a medal which is to be given each year to that member of the winning team who makes the best speech in an annual debating contest between the high schools of the county. The proposition to present the medal was made to the teachers of Johnston county and was accepted by them at a meeting held not long ago. The medal will be a handsome one valued at ten dollars.

Stipulations for the debates have already been arranged. Six high schools will enter the contest. Each school will furnish

two teams. Two debates will be held on the same night, one at home, one away at some one of the other schools, by each high school. The places on the teams are limited in only one general way: boys alone are eligible. The medal will go to that debater on the winning side in the final contest who makes the best speech.

The purpose of the club in establishing the medal is to encourage interest both in debating and in the University. The motive is most patriotic.
