Wake Forest Gives Tar Heels Trouble

WEATHER CONDITIONS BAD

Combating Teams Slip and Slide Through Mud and Water

At Raleigh, Saturday, with Tandy, Homewood, and Capt. Tayloe out of the game, Carolina defeated Wake Forest 12-7. The Tar Heels started off too easy, thinking they had a walk-over. But Wake Forest came out for trouble, evidently with the intention of crippling somebody. In this, however, they failed, with the exception of two of their own men, who had to be carried off the field. Not a Carolina man was injured. Seemingly, in the first half Wake Forest took advantage of the situation and by two forward passes made a ring around the heavy team in the mud, and netted about forty yards, which brought them on Carolina's 15 yard line. Line plunges carried the ball over. But the old Carolina spirit survived, and the team's usual comeback succeeded in keeping the ball from getting seriously near Carolina's goal during the remainder of the game.

Again Carolina played nothing but straight football, for it began to rain and the ball was too wet for forward passes to be manipulated. Of course, no new plays were tried. On the offense Carolina's line bucking did some good work, but the punting of Foust probably aided more than any one factor. He completely outclassed the Wake Forest pun-

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FORMER COACHES COMING

Pendleton and Wilson Will Coach Team on Lats Lap.

Wednesday afternoon Coach Trenchard consulted with a small group of students, and the result of the conference was that an agreement was made to raise by subscription a fund of two hundred and fifty dollars for the purpose of paying the expenses of Tol Pendleton and Tom Wilson, last year's coaches, for the last week's coaching before the Virginia game. It was also decided to use a part of this money to pay half of Dave Tayloe's and George Tandy's expenses to Philadelphia to see Virginia play Swarthmore. Needless to say, the money for such a cause was raised with dispatch. Pendleton and Wilson are here and Tandy and Tayloe saw Virginia in action. Each of the academic fraternities gave ten dollars apiece, and the rest of the money was collected by canvassing the dormitories.

The results of this move will be inestimable. Wilson has been coaching the line at Wisconsin this fall, and Pendleton has been helping at Princeton for the last few weeks. What the Tar Heel squad won't know about football when these five men, Trenchard, Bluethenthal, Cunningham, Wilson, and Pendleton, plus some of the alumni, get through with them won't be worth knowing. The University is also to be congratulated on securing Quarterback Emmons as a coach. Emmons starred two years on the Princeton team and is a shark on all kinds of football affairs. A word as to the composer and this particular work of his. It is difficult to explain the significance of Strauss in the development of modern music. His adherents think of him as the giant who "liberated" music from Wagner. In this way: When Wagner composed an opera, he expressed in music the emotions that accompany the thought or the action of a story that was already in existence; when Strauss composes a "tone poem", he expresses the thought or the action itself. His music needs no libretto. At least, Strauss's adherents claim this for him.

This is a bold claim; but Strauss is the boldest of composers. (Continued on third page.)

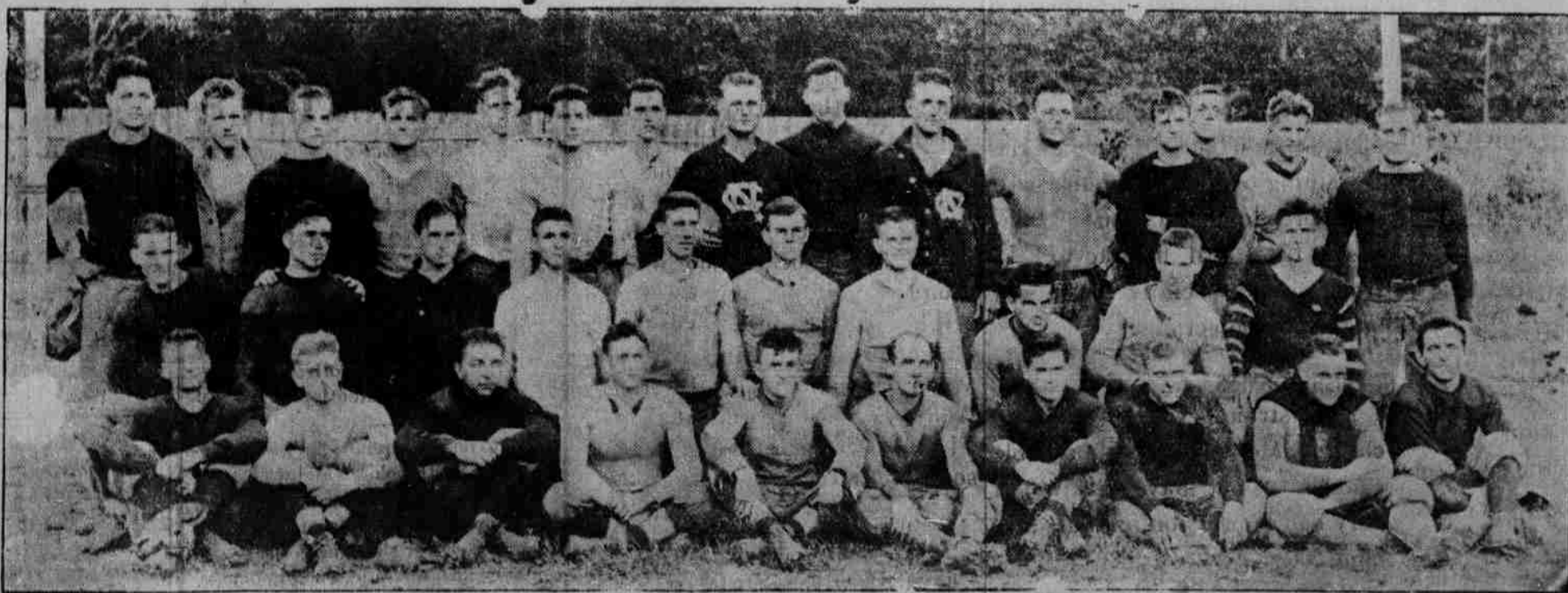
