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### DR. HAMILTON IS HONORED

Professor of History Is Elected Honorary Member of Phi Kappa Society.

Dr. J. G. deR. Hamilton, alumni Professor of history of the State University, was on Saturday night elected honorary member of the Phi Kappa Society by William and Mary College, of Williamsburg, Va., the mother of the high-scholarship organization of America. Dr. Hamilton has been voted this high distinction through the literary merits of his recent historical book, "Reconstruction in North Carolina." ### Dramatic Club Visits Three Eastern Towns.

The press was also very complimentary and commended the splendid work of the members of the cast.

The alumni, in whose hands the advertising and entertaining was placed, responded to the demands made upon them with true Carolina spirit. The hosts and hostesses in the various cities in which the play was presented were most cordial, affording the players the very best of entertainment.

The first performance was given at St. Mary's on Monday night, December 7. The girls' enjoyment of the play was most evident if the repeated applause was an indication. Rev. Lay, principal of the school, was most hospitable in his entertainment of the Club. The Carolina boys were given the joyful privilege of dining with some 300 of St. Mary's girls. ### One of America's Greatest Men To Speak Here

It will be a matter of state-wide interest that Dr. John R. Mott will be at the University of North Carolina for a series of addresses February 12-14, 1915. Dr. Mott is the world's greatest Christian statesman and is considered by many to be the greatest single personality in our time. In a telegram to Harper's Weekly, President Wilson characterized Mr. Mott as "one of the most notably useful men in the world." The agencies of his usefulness are the great student movements of America, Europe, and Asia. He is the directing force of the Student Volunteer Movement, executive secretary of the International Young Men's Christian Association, founder and general secretary of the World's Christian Student Federation, and chairman of the Continuation Committee which heads up the missionary enterprises of five continents. Besides his enormous religious activities, Mr. Mott is a statesman whose influence is felt in the political and social life of the world. The great men of the world see his many-sided greatness in terms of their special fields and world politics.

Williams Jennings Bryan, Secretary of State says of him: "The one man who is best fitted to represent the interests of Christianity and of his country in the newly established republic of China."

Justice Brewer of the Supreme Court: "Two of the greatest diplomats this country has ever seen are the late John Hay and John R. Mott."

President Butler of Columbia University, Chancellor Brown of New York University, and Editor Haggood of Harper's Weekly commend him without reserve as one of the greatest leaders of modern times.

Captains of industry have recognized the wonderful organizing genius of Mr. Mott in offering him executive positions in great business enterprises. Yale University wished to appoint him dean of the Divinity School. President Wilson and Secretary Bryan offered him the ambassadorship to China. But Mr. Mott has kept his heart true to the masterpassion of his life, the evangelization of the world in this generation.
