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DR. HAMILTON IS HONORED

Do you know how to Spot? Professor of History Is Elected Honorary Member of Phi Kappa Society.

> Dr. J. G. deR. Hamilton, alumni Professor of history of the State University, was on Saturday night elected honorary member of the Phi Kappa Society by William and Mary College, of Williamsburg, Va., the mother of the high-scholarship organization of America. Dr. Hamilton has been voted this high distinction through the literary merits of his recent historical book, "Reconstruction in North Carolina." The Patterson Cup, awarded by the North Carolina Literary and Historical Society, was likewise won by the University Professor on this literary contribution to North Carolina history. The honorary membership in America's high-scholarship organization is a recognition voted authors and writers who have published some literars production of lasting merit, and "Reconstruction in North Carolina" distinctly comes under that classification. - Raleigh News and Observer.



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
