### MOTT.

#### One of the Six Best

THE TAR HEEL on April 23, 1914 had the following as part of an editorial.

"Some one asked the Bureau of Extension who, in its opinion, were the six most conspicuous men in the world today? The answer was Woodrow Wilson, Bernard Shaw, Theodore Roosevelt, David Lloyd-George, Andrew Carnegie, and John R. Mott. Can you make a better choice?"

#### What Norman Haggood Says.

Norman Haggood, formerly editor of Colliers and now editor of Harper's says "who is doing most to connect religion with the lives of men today? Some observers of ability answer "John R. Mott." That opinion explains why one of the most quietly influential men in this country called Mr. Mott 'The greatest man alive'. It is a startling opinion but it is based on thought'.

The leading business men and Philanthropists just referred to when pressed to say wherein Mott is "great" told why. Mott has united the missionary effort of the world. Christianity on the foreign field has been brought into the "Christian Unity" and harmony talked about for generations, but not realized until under his competent leadership. He is known throughout the world by the student body--the leaders of intelligence. He has had much influence on the Chinese situation of the last decade. His student movement at home in the college Y. M. C. A.'s has altered the tone of student life, and bettered many thousands of men. Finally, he is great because he is skilled in administration, a master of detail, large in vision, exact in statement, a canny raiser of friends, gifted with insight in the choice of helpers, strong willed."

#### Justice David Brewer of the Supreme Court

"Two of the greatest diplomats the country has ever seen are the late John Hay and John R. Mott.

#### President Butler of Columbia University

"Mr. Mott has exercised and is

exercising a powerful influence in behalf of the peace and good order of the world."

#### A New York Man

"Mott is the greatest man I know, unless possibly it be the President himself. Mott thinks in terms of continents; he plans for the world."

#### Woodrow Wilson

"Mr. Mott is recognized everywhere as one of the leading forces in the modern Christian world. I know of no more desirable representative of the things we ought all to set our hearts to."

### MOTTAGRAMS

"In the history of Christianity there has never been such a remarkable conjunction of opportunities and crises on all the principle mission fields and of favoring circumstances and possibilities on the home field.

"Our prayers are not measured by their extent, but by their content.

"College men are in peculiar need of encouragement and direction toward Christian life and service, and are responsive to the right experiences in these directions.

"There are sad cases in nearly every college of young men who have made shipwreck of their faith and drifted into lives of sin because they were not properly anchored at the very beginning of their college life."

"We need in all our student associations more men who will devote the same intense and thorough study to the problems of Christian life and work that they employ when they prepare themselves to win a debate, or write a prize oration or thesis."

One of the chief reasons, apparently, why Christ went apart for prolonged prayer is the very reason why many busy Christians excuse themselves--the fact that he had so much to do and that the issues at stake were so great.

"We need to study the methods of Christ in training men.... One of the most far-reaching things Christ ever did was to train a little band of men.

"Christians need a fuller, more constant and more commanding realization of the personal presence of Christ."

The above quotations show that Mr. Mott is not a sensational phrase manipulator. He does not secure his results by sensationalism or surface emotions. The key words to his success are power, efficiency, knowledge, courage, and common sense.

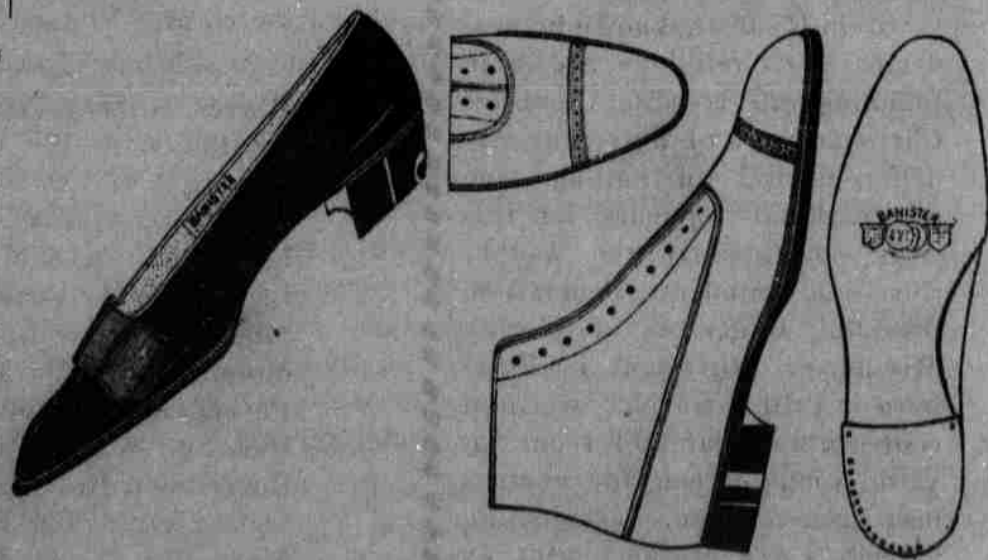
