GARDNER HUDSON TO REPRESENT CAROLINA

Wins in Peace Prize Orator Preliminaries

Last Monday night in the preliminaries for the Peace Contest Gardner Hudson of Smithfield won first place by a unanimous decision of the judges. His subject was "The Development of the International Mind."

Although the decision of the judges was unanimous, the contest was by no means one-sided. John Stell with a good speech on "Practical Peace" crossed the tape second. The others who were in the contest and who made things quite interesting for the first two men were Virginius Williams, Frank Auld, Henry Mock, Marion Ross, and William Marlowe.

Gardner Hudson will go to Raleigh to compete with representatives from other state colleges, and the winner in this contest will be sent to represent the state in a national contest.

300 SCHOOLS WILL DEBATE

In the State High School Contest on Navy Enlargement

Triangular debates throughout the state occur Friday March 31, which is the 4th anniversary of High School Debating Union contests. At this time the query: "Resolved, That the U. S. should adopt the policy of greatly enlarging its Navy" will be debated in more than 300 schools in 94 counties of the state. This is the largest contest of the Union that has been staged thus far. The total estimated audiences will be 75,000. Buncombe county will have 14 schools debating on March 31. Robeson 12, Mecklenburg 11, Guilford 10, Alamance 9, Johnston, Nashe, Wake and Durham 7 each, Gaston, Iredell, Union Sampson, Rowan, Warren have 6 each. The final contest for the Aycock Cup will be held in Chapel Hill on April 13 and 14.

CAROLINA DOWNS ELON

Shows Great Improvement and Wins 18 to 4

Carolina defeated Elon Saturday by the score of 18 to 4 in a game which lasted for two and a half hours. Carolina's playing showed a considerable improvement over that against Oak Ridge. Currie started the pitching, but soon gave way to Powell, who finished the game without being scored on. Bennett caught a good game and incidentally slammed out a three bagger with the bases loaded. The Carolina team was far superior to Elon's for the fifteen men used by Carolina made two errors to Elon's seven. The hitting of Bailey, Zollicoffer, Bennett, and Powell was of material aid in piling up Carolina's 18 runs. The playing of Bailey and the pitching and hitting of Powell were features of the game.

CAROLINA CHOOSES TRIANGULAR DEBATERS

Bradshaw and Ruffin, Edney and Crouse Are Picked

Messrs. F. F. Bradshaw and Tom Ruffin were chosen Wednesday night to represent the affirmative for Carolina in the triangular debate, while Messrs. C. R. Edney and R. F. Crouse were named for the negative side. The question was, "Resolved, That the Federal Government should compel all able bodied men, between the ages of 18 and 24, under adequate provision, to take military or naval training."

The affirmative side of the varsity will debate Virginia at Baltimore, while the negative will contest with Johns Hopkins at Charlottesville. Virginia and Johns Hopkins will debate here.

The debate was hotly contested. The others who tried out were: affirmative, Pike and Coates; negative, Shuford, Dysart, Sharpe, and Hackler.

CAROLINA, WORKING IN FINE FORM, OVERWHELMS W. VIRGINIA WESLEYAN

Score Is 11 to 3. Powell Pitches Good Game.

Zollicoffer Makes 4 Runs in 4 Times Up.

Carolina's baseball machine, working more efficiently than it had hitherto worked this season, defeated the West Virginia Wesleyan Friday 11 to 3. Wesleyan made its three runs in the eighth inning after Carolina's substitutes had been put in.

The game was featured by the costly wild throws of the visitors and the pitching of Powell, who allowed only two hits in the six innings that he pitched. Zollicoffer made four runs in four times at bat. Bailey and Massey also did good work. With Captain Patterson shifted to short and Massey on second the infield showed up especially well.

1st Inning

W. Va. W.: Miller out, third to first. Blake out on a grounder to first. Singleton fans.

Carolina: Zollicoffer safe on short's error. Patterson safe on first, Zolly on second when pitcher throws wild on Patterson's bunt. Barnes fans. Zollicoffer scores on catcher's wild peg. Pippin walks. Massey doubles, scoring Patterson and Pippin. Bailey bunts, scoring Massey. Powell is safe on an error, but Lewis is out on a grounder to short.

2nd Inning

W. Va. W.: Johnson singles over second. Shumaker forces Johnson at second. Talkington pops to Angel who catches Shumaker off the base.

Carolina: Angel out to left field. Zollicoffer walks. Patterson flies out. Barnes is safe on second's error. Zollicoffer scores from third when catcher tries to catch Barnes at second. Pippin fans.

3rd Inning

W. Va. W.: Powell fans Beck, Wagner, and Miller.

Carolina: Massey and Bailey single. Massey out, stealing. Powell singles. Lewis singles, scoring Bailey. Angel fans. Zollicoffer doubles scoring Lewis and Powell. Patterson walks. Zolly scores on catcher's peg to second. No more runs were made. Score 9 to 0.

4th Inning

Wesleyan goes out in one, two, three order; and Carolina, with the exception of Lewis' walk, does the same.

5th Inning

W. Va. W. Shumaker pops to third, Talkington and Beck fan.

Carolina: Zollicoffer safe on short's error, goes to third on wild throws and scores after Patterson walks, on Barnes grounder to the pitcher. Wood and Massey ground out.

6th Inning

W. Va. W.: Withers singles by first. Wagner, Miller, and Blake go out easily.

Carolina: After Bailey's double, Powell, Lewis, and Angel come up but leave him stranded. Score 10 to 0.

7th Inning

W. Va. W.: Blake, Singleton, and Johnson are easy outs.

Carolina in her turn fails to score.

8th Inning

W. Va. W.: Talkington flies out. Beck is safe on Hardison's error, steals second. Withers fans. Wagner walks. Miller hits a slow bouncer to short, beating it out to first and scoring Beck and Wagner. Miller scores on Blake's single by short. Singleton flies out.

Carolina: Bailey safe on a scratch hit to short. Plyler sacrifices him to second Lewis doubles, scoring Bailey. Angel and Hardison fly out.
