Carolina Wins From Virginia play Barnes came in home. but Loses to Hopkins

Johns Hopkins won out Saturday night in the triangular debate by defeating Carolina at Charlottesville and Virginia at Chapel Hill.

Carolina represented by F. F. Bradshaw and T. F. Ruffin won from Virginia at Baltimore by the unanimous decision of five judges, but lost at Charlottesville in spite of the hard work of Crouse and Edney. The query was: "Resolved, That our Federal Government compel every ablebodied citizen, between the ages of 18 and 24 years to take under adequate provision, one year of military or naval training."
