### WEAVER HEAD OF MUSIC ORGANIZATION IN SOUTH

Elected President of Southern Branch  
of Music Supervisors' National Conference.

At the recent Music Supervisor's National Conference held in Nashville, Tenn., Prof. P. J. Weaver, head of the University's department of music, was elected president of the Southern branch of the National conference.

This new branch of the organization includes Texas, Oklahoma, Kentucky, West Virginia, Virginia, and all states south and east of these, and it is over these states, organized into the new unit that Mr. Weaver was elected president.

At the conference of the national organization, of which Mr. Weaver was vice president during the past year, over twelve hundred members attended. It was the first time that the conference was ever held in the south, and was considered a big event for Tennessee's capital by people there.

The Southern branch is now planning to meet in the early fall, the conference to be held in Atlanta, Birmingham, or New Orleans. All music teachers from the southern states will be asked to attend.

#### AIR ROUTE TO PANAMA

Washington, March 30.—Plans for early establishment of an air route to the Panama canal zone as a measure of national defense are being made by the war department, Secretary Weeks announced today. When landing places have been surveyed and selected, he said, army planes will be sent to the zone under their own power. "I regard the canal zone and Hawaii as the two most important posts the army has," Mr. Weeks said.
