

CAROLINA STEPS ON TRINITY IN FIRST TRACK MEET OF SEASON

Norris took the shot put, with a pretty put of 35 feet, 1 1-2 inches. A 16-pound shot put was used. Poindexter and Hogan followed second and third respectively.

"Johnny" Purser took the two mile in a walk. He left his man 100 yards behind on the final lap. Purser took the lead at the beginning of the fourth lap, and was never approached by Cabe of Trinity from then on. With each succeeding lap he increased the margin of his lead. "Bill" Smith made a good run but failed to place. After running nearly two miles, he still had the strength to sprint for one-half of the final lap.

Dave Sinclair ran the best time he ever made when he took the 220 yard dash in 23 3-5 seconds. He took the lead at the crack of the starter's pistol and held it doggedly throughout the distance. Close followers of track think that Sinclair will lower the record in this event if he keeps up the rapid pace which he has been setting.

Ranson and Seyffert Place in Mile
Running a good mile in fair time, Ranson crossed the tape in the mile run with an 8 yard lead. Schuster of Trinity took the lead at the start and set his own pace for the first lap. He was unable to keep it up, and gave place to Ranson on the second lap, who was followed by Seyffert. Ranson set his pace too slow in the first lap. Schuster came back on the final lap and again took the lead, holding it this time for a little over a quarter of a lap, but was again passed by Ranson. Seyffert ran a good mile, and is expected to make one of the best men on the team.

For a time it looked as though the Blue and White team would fail to place in the 880, but Van Lanningham managed to show his heels to Trinity's fast half miler, Durham. Ambler took the lead and set the pace for the first quarter, but was unable to keep up the pace he was setting and gave place to Durham at the start of the final lap, with more experience he should form a valuable man. Van Lanningham passed him on the last 100 yards of the run.

Holding the lead and setting the pace throughout the quarter Whitaker finished in first place for Carolina in 440. Murchison ran a good quarter, but was in poor shape and unable to keep up with the fast pace which the Carolina lad was running.

Giersch finished in first place in the 120 yard high hurdles easily with a lead of 6 yards. He was followed by McGlauhen. "He got a good start and steadily increased the margin of his lead as he took each hurdle. Harris, of Trinity, finished third with a good distance separating him and McGlauhen. Giersch made a good showing in the meet, and in addition to winning first place in this event, he tied with Fishchal and Ranson for first place in the pole vault.

"Shark" Ross took first place in the broad jump with 20 feet. Ross had been out only a few days, and shows much promise.

Two fine looking ones have just been completed in front of fraternity row along the daily route from Swain Hall to the postoffice, one back of the co-ed dormitory and two more between Memorial and Gerard Halls. This makes a total of five to cover the loss of eight, but the program is not complete.

The program provides for about twenty more between Emerson field and the newly built class athletic field. However it is impossible to say how long before work can begin on these.

CONSENSUS OF OPINION IS LIBRARY MUST BE LARGER

Since the library has been gradually growing for the past few years by contributions of persons from their private libraries and since the library has added on a great deal of extension work, there is a great deal of talk about enlarging the present library or building one on a new site.

Dr. Wilson, the librarian, says that the library here should contain the following departments: general and special reading rooms, special libraries, seminar rooms and offices for instructors, clerical and cataloguing space, recitation rooms for classes in library science.

There is a great deal of debate as to whether the present one should be enlarged or another one built on a different site.

The next question is as to just where the site of a new library should be. Dr. John M. Booker suggested that the library at the southern end of the campus since this will be more desirable in the future as the University grows southward. If it is built on the present site or on that of Person Hall nearby it will be a very inconvenient place in the future.

Commencement Debate Query Will Be Announced Shortly

After submitting a query relative to the repeal of the Sherman act, to the Juniors of the Dialectic society, which they would not accept, the Philanthropic Juniors presented another subject for their consideration, on Saturday night.

The second query submitted: Resolved that there should be compulsory arbitration of disputes between coal mine owners and operators, should make a good subject for the Junior commencement debate.

This year the Phi submits the query and the Di chooses the side that it desires to defend. Last year the Dialectic debaters, Grisette and Warren, were victorious in the Junior debate, over Moore and Horner, of the Phi. Mr. Grisette won the Bingham medal, which is given to the best debater on the winning team, in this debate.

The preliminaries for the debate will be announced at an early date. Every Junior who is a member of one of the societies, may go out for this debate.

OLYMPIC IS PLANNED TO BE HELD MAY 5 AND 6

Old State Track Meet Is No More in Comparison with Great Event Now Planned.

The old State Tract Meet which has been held in different colleges for the last twenty years, has gone, and in its place has come what is known by the more dignified name of an Olympic, to be held on the Trinity Track May 5 and 6, according to the plans advanced by Dr. Foy Robertson. Besides the old meet there will be swimming contests, boxing, wrestling, high school track, Military events, golf, barnyard golf, a proposed tourney for the baseball championship of the state.

Dr. Robertson is president of the association which is attempting to promote it, and is being assisted by M. R. Clark, who is acting as Director General of Games. If the Olympic goes through as planned it will be the biggest event pull yet. It is the first State Olympic ever held in the United States.

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
