PRESS ASSOCIATION IS TO PUBLISH ANTHOLOGY

The North Carolina Collegiate Press Association at a recent meeting, decided to publish compilation of representative North Carolina Short Stories in the form of an Anthology. The ten or twelve best short stories submitted will be published in the Anthology. The requirements are as follows:

1. Any bona fide member of a North Carolina college may submit a

2. Any number of short stories may be submitted by the same au-

3. All stories, fulfilling the above conditions which have been written during the past two years are eligible, irrespective of whether they have been published.

4. It is suggested that the length # of the story shall not exceed 6000 words.

5. Two typewritten copies of each story must be submitted.

6. A short personal sketch (100 words) of the author must be turned in in a sealed envelope attached to each story.

7. All stories must be turned in before Dec. 15 to the editors of the respective college magazines and in colleges where there are no magazines published, to the editor of college publication.

8. The best stories will be selected for publication by a committee of literary educators in the State.

9. The \$50 prize for the best story will be awarded on the decision of judges selected outside of the State.




