A. has constructed a lunch counter at the old well in order to relieve the eating situation. Everything is primed for a big day; it is even rumored that the Orange county bootleggers have on hand an extra stock of wares.



Neither Team Played Last Saturday-But Worked Hard For Today's Battle

VIRGINIA ARRIVES TODAY

The Old Dominion Squad Spent Last Night Over in Durham

After a rest of a week and a half, the latest reports assert that both Carolina and Virginia are in the pink of condition for their 27th. annual contest. There has been much speculation as to whether Diffey, Cavalier quarterback, and Captain Blackford will be able to play, but although no official announcement has been received from the Virginia coaching staff, it is believed by close followers of the game that both men will take the field this afternoon. The Virginia squad arrived in Durham last night where they will remain until a few hours before the game. The Tar Heels were cordered to bed early to benefit from a good night's sleep.

Trying to figure which team has the edge from past rocords presents a difficult problem, for both teams have shown flashes of good and poor football. At the first of the season, Carolina had decidedly the strongest team on paper. but Virginia's impressive work against the powerful V. P. I. team which squeezed out a close 6-3 victory with two of the main cogs in the Cavaliers' machine out of the game, gave Virginia an even balance with her southern rivals.

Carolina is in the best condition since the costly Wake Forest game, costly because of the loss of George Sparrow; Captain Casey has recovered from the injuries which hampered his playing in recent games and (Continued on Page Five)
