Ager, who received his MA in June, became Southern Conference singles champion this past season by defeating teammate Del Sylvia in the finals of the annual tournament at Davidson. Later he teamed with Tar Heel Bob Luxenberg to win the doubles title, making it a clean sweep for Carolina in 1951 conference tennis.

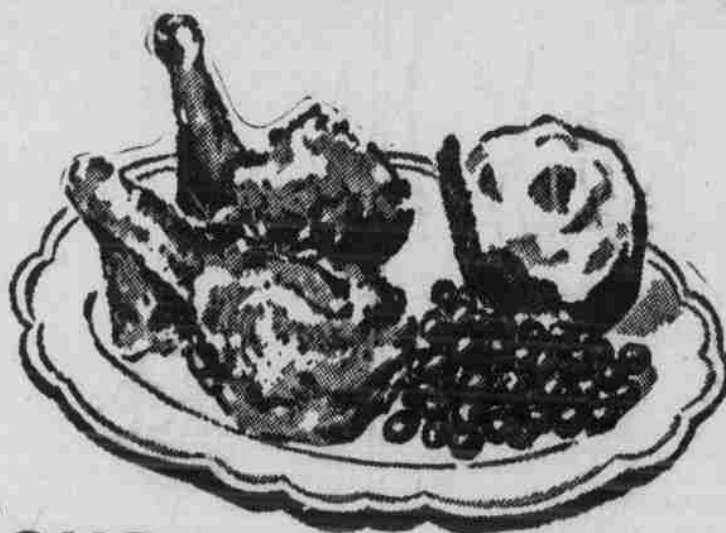
