

Free World Study Planned

The fundamental issues involved in the world-wide conflict between communism and democracy will be subjected to a thorough analysis and study at a Free-World Workshop which opens here Sunday and continues for a week.

Forty school teachers from throughout the State have been selected to participate in the program. Selection was made on the basis of interest and community leadership qualities.

Scholarships covering the expenses of the participants have been awarded by the University.

The workshop will be directed by Prof. E. M. Adams of the Department of Philosophy of the University and will be administered by the University Extension Division.

Primary objective of the workshop, according to Prof. Adams, is "to contribute to a better and fuller understanding of the fundamental issues involved in the most basic and important conflict in the present world crisis: A conflict not primarily between two geographical areas, East and West; nor between two powerful states, Russia and the United States; but a conflict between two ideologies for the minds and hearts of men and women everywhere.

"It is the duty of everyone to seek to understand the ideas and ideals involved in this conflict, for this is the only way in which truth and freedom can triumph," he said. "Public school teachers are in a position to stimulate and lead the thinking not only of their pupils but of their entire communities. The workshop is designed as an aid to selected teachers in their attempts to promote discussion and understanding in their school communities of the fundamental issues in the ideological struggle between democracy and communism."

Opening the week-long program

will be Dr. Clyde A. Irwin, state superintendent of public instruction, who will address a banquet session Sunday night in the Carolina Inn. Chancellor Robert B. House will address the closing banquet session Friday night.

Classes will be held Monday through Friday, July 16-20, in the Morehead Building. Topics will include: Thought Defense in the Present World Crisis, Democratic

Theory of Man and the State, Communist Theory of Man and the State, Democratic Theory of Culture, Communist Theory of Culture, Social Structure of a Capitalistic Democracy, a Social Democracy and a Communist Society, Contemporary Life and Movements of the Soviet Union, Strategy and Tactics of World Communism and World Democracy.
