Chapel Hill's batting average in the current issue of Collier's Magazine is pretty high. Two out of five stories in the fiction department are by former students in the creative writing classes taught here by Prof. Phillips Russell. One of them, Noel Houston, makes his home in Chapel Hill. The other, Mrs. Susanne McConnaughey, who lived here some years ago, is the wife of James Connaughey, novelist.

Houston's story, "The Sky Goddess," is the first fiction piece in the magazine and is colorfully illustrated with a full-page picture. It relates several dare-devil experiences of himself and other youthful companions during his boyhood days in Oklahoma.

Mrs. McConnaughey's story is part two of a six-part serial about Tahiti.

Reporters Will Attend Atomic Clinic

A number of North Carolina newspapermen will attend the Regional Press Seminar on Atomic Energy at Oak Ridge, Tenn., Friday and Saturday, August 13-14, according to Russell M. Grumman, director of the Extension Division, a member of the committee on arrangements.

The committee is made up of representatives of the National University Extension Association, the Atomic Energy Commission, and the press associations in the southeastern states.

The seminar will get underway with registration at 9 a. m. Monday morning, August 13, and the first session is scheduled for that afternoon. A basic explanation for the layman of atomic energy will be given by Dr. William G. Pollard, Executive Director, Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies. A question and answer period will follow.

Sumner T. Pike, member of the Atomic Energy Commission, will address a dinner session Monday night.

Speakers on Tuesday's program will include Dr. Max R. Zelle, Division of Biology and Medicine, Atomic Energy Commission Governor Gordon Browning of Tennessee; Millard Caldwell, Federal Civil Defense Administrator; Dr. James G. Beckerly, Director of the Office of Classification, Atomic Energy Commission; and Morse Salisbury, Director, Division of Information Services, Atomic Energy Commission.

Other features of the program will include tours of the Oak Ridge laboratory, the American Museum of Atomic Energy, and a showing of "Operation Sandstone," a new color movie of the 1948 Eniwetok weapon test.

Alumnus Pens First Story On War Talks

Because the cards "fell right," a young Associated Press reporter and alumnus of the University wrote the first news story on the Korean armistice talks.

Sam Summerlin, who was formerly attached to the Associated Press' Raleigh bureau, in a letter to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. I. W. Summerlin of Chapel Hill, said, "There wasn't much to the story since the officers who came back from Kaesong had very little to tell us, but it was about the greatest thrill I ever had."

"All the newsreel cameramen were grinding away at me, and still cameramen were snapping pictures as I picked out the story on the front hood of a jeep," he wrote. "I was shaking a bit but managed to bang out the story."

The Chapel Hillian, youngest of all the newspaper correspondents in Korea, won the privilege to write the first story on the talks when he drew a king from a deck of playing cards—the highest card drawn. The correspondents had agreed that, since only one story could be telephoned to Tokyo, they would draw for the job.

All four news services—Associated Press, United Press, International News Service and Reuter's—relayed the same story to the United States.

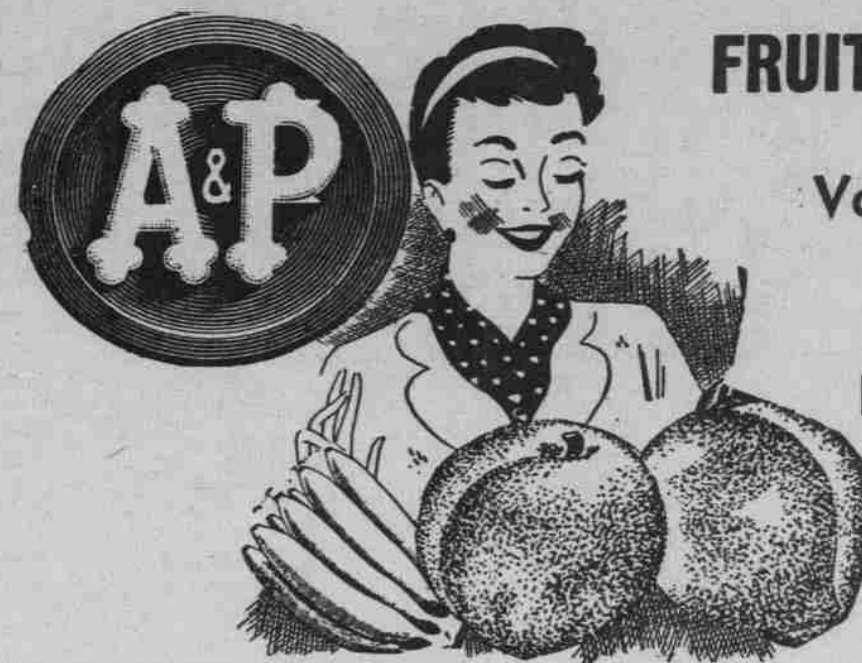
