John Riebel Assumes Post As YMCA Secretary

Among the more recent arrivals on the Carolina scene is John D. Riebel, new associate director of the YMCA, who replaces Robert L. Barrus this month.

Mr. Riebel received his B.A. degree from North Central College, Naperville, Illinois, in 1937. After graduation he was with the Chicago YMCA until 1941.

He studied at the Duke University School of Medicine from 1943 through 1945 and received a diploma in physical therapy. He was acting director of a course in physical therapy there in 1946. From Duke Mr. Riebel went to Yale Divinity School, receiving his B.D. in 1949. Upon leaving Yale he became the assistant minister of the Summerfield Methodist Church in New Haven, Connecticut.

Originally from Detroit, Michigan, Mr. Riebel came to Chapel Hill from Los Angeles, California, where he had served as secretary for student work in the Pacific Southwest Area Board of the YMCA since 1949.

Mr. Riebel is now serving in an advisory capacity for the Open Arboretum committee, and is a member of the Summer Activities



steering committee, aside from his regular duties. His initial responsibilities for the coming school term will be the Freshman Camp to be held from September 12-14. Mr. Riebel and his wife, the former Peggy Royall of Elkin, are residing at 126 1/2 North St. Mrs. Riebel was graduated from Greensboro College in 1946 with an A.B. in religious education.

Attend Meet

Dean Guy B. Phillips of the School of Education; Charles F. Milner, associate director of the University Extension Division, and Supt. C. W. Davis of the Chapel Hill schools are attending the annual North Carolina Superintendents Conference at Mars Hill College this week.

The rotary hoe for cultivating tobacco is winning the praise of many Tar Heel farmers at demonstrations being conducted in all parts of the State.

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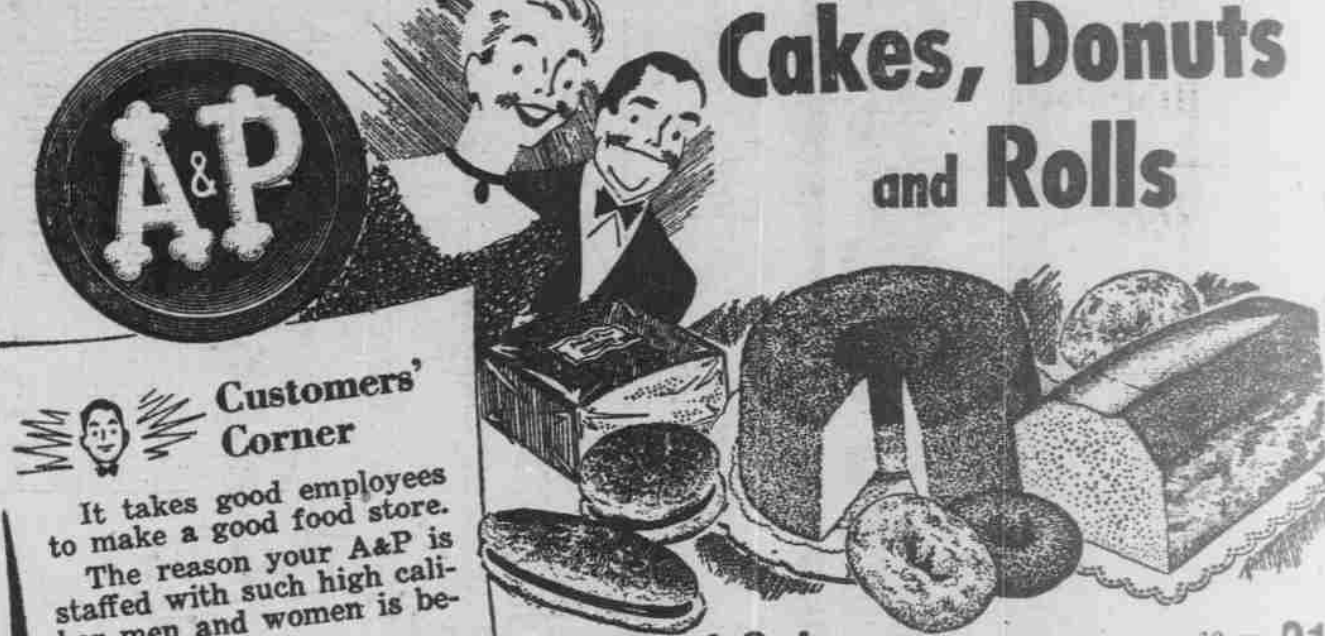
