gram of student affairs designed to strengthen the educational benefits to the students deriving from their experiences outside the classroom. He will be responsible for formulating policies and programs of student welfare and for direction of the activities enumerated above.

The Chancellor pointed out that the organizational changes in the area of student affairs are in accordance with a plan to organize the ad-

ministrative structure of the University at Chapel Hill into five general areas with a single administrative officer at the head of each under the Chancellor.

These are academic affairs, student affairs, business affairs, development, and health affairs. This pattern of organization, he said, has been widely adopted in institutions of higher education in this country.

This administrative change has been completed in the University for a number of years and was confirmed by the report of the management study firm of Cresap, McCormick, and Paget, which made an administrative survey of the University. Chancellor House said. This survey has been under discussion throughout the University and by the Board of Trustees during the past year, he added.

Dean Weaver, a native of Aberdeen, is a 1937 graduate of the University here. He received his A. M. degree in history from Harvard in 1950. He was a teaching fellow in economics here in 1937-38 and Assistant Dean of Students from 1938 to 1941.

He served as American Vice-Counsel in Rio de Janeiro in 1942 and served in the U.S. Navy from 1942-46. He was instructor in economics at the University in 1946-47 before becoming Dean of Students in 1948. Dean Weaver had a traveling fellowship to study the administration of student affairs in American colleges from the Carnegie Corporation of New York in 1952.
