### UNC Grad Student In Ceylon Writes Of Foreign Adventure

Gene D. Danner, who is in Ceylon on a Fulbright study on a Fulbright grant, has been filling his letters to his family here with his impressions of the national University of Ceylon, which he is attending. He writes from some of his first letters: "The girls here have it all. Each has a complete set of teeth or four servants, but the best there is only one for each room."

These girls are all helpful and intelligent. However, the socialists and communists seem to dominate.

One night I was bombarded with questions: "Which is the best rule in the U. S.? Is not the accumulation of wealth getting larger and smaller? Why does Ike beat McCarthy? Why does McCarthy become so powerful? What is the difference between socialism in Germany and in England?"

The school is coeducational in the best sense, but the girls are entirely separated and must be in by 7 p.m. And it is impossible to kiss a girl before engagement. Although there are very beautiful nobody dares talk to them. It seems that my life will suffer considerably.

Finally, as in Germany, etc., in most countries I've been in, the people consider themselves to be in the middle block between the great world powers. And as in most countries they will not and do not give credit any altruistic or humanitarian motives on the part of their country—much less the U. S. There is not any strong hatred for the U. S. here as there is supposed to be in India. But neither is there any of "the USSR."

### Di Senate Against Private Utility Bill; U.S. Senate For

The Dialectic Senate met Tuesday night at eight in New West to consider a bill condemning President Eisenhower's proposal to turn over power provision for the atomic energy program to private sources.

The Senate was unanimous in approving the bill. Some of the arguments used in reaching this decision were that such action would be hasty, ill-timed, an added cost to taxpayers, or abandonment of great strides made in the development of cheap public power, poor for security purposes, and a sellout to private power interests who are not capable of handling the job.

The following resolutions were adopted by the Senate: "Be it resolved that: (1) The AEC be authorized to obtain its power through a suitable federally controlled agency; and that (2) the Congress reject the current proposal to hand over our public natural resources in a "giveaway" exploitation by private interests."

*Editor's note: There must be two sides to this as in every question. It was announced the same evening that the Senate in Washington had with some revisions, passed the above-condemned proposal.*

The Dialectic Senate will meet again Tuesday, August 3 at 7:30 p.m. on the third floor of New West. The bill for debate will be prepared by Gene Cook on U. S. Far Eastern Foreign Policy.

This bill will include the Indo-China truce, the proposed SATO, and the British proposal for a Locarno Pact.

### Foreign Students On Tour Are Guests At The University

A chartered Greyhound coach carrying 35 young international students whizzed up to Morehead Planetarium yesterday afternoon.

These youngsters are a part of the 200-300 foreign students of high school age who are touring the U. S. this summer under the auspices of the American Field Service International scholarship program. Having spent the past year in American high schools, they are now engaged in a 14-day, 3,000 mile trip across America.

While they are here the youngsters are staying at the homes of 17 local families.

This afternoon at 4 o'clock the University Athletic Association will play host to the youths at a swimming party.

Following this, the Chapel Hill eating establishments have scheduled a famous picnic at which the visitors will be welcomed by Roy Armstrong, director of admissions, and Roy Holden, assistant dean of students.

On Friday morning at 9 o'clock they will climb back into their bus to continue the extended jaunt. The tour will end in New York on August 31; the students will then leave for their own countries.

### Accidents Theme Of School Course

An accredited course on Home Accident Prevention is being held this week by the Department of Public Health Nursing, School of Public Health.

A representative from the U. S. Public Health Service, Miss Madeline Poretsky, is teaching the course.

This is the first time Home Accident Prevention has been included in the courses of special fields in Public Health Nursing, which have been offered for the last seven years.

To be admitted to these courses, a course must be a graduate of an approved school of nursing and be registered. Non-nurse students must meet regular University requirements.

While the courses are designed especially for Public Health Nurses, other interested persons are invited to attend.

Other courses in this series are on Tobacco Control, scheduled August 27; Geriatrics, August 29-31; and Cardiovascular Diseases, August 14-21.
