

Charlie Jones, Frank Graham To Speak In New York Meet

The Summer Conference of the Presbyterian Church in Rensselaerville, New York, will have two eminent Chapel Hillians as speakers during the month of August.

Reverend Charles M. Jones, of the Chapel Hill Community Church, and Dr. Frank P. Graham, former president of the University, will participate in the series of meetings entitled "Christianity and the Crisis of Freedom."

Reverend Jones, who has been vacationing with his family in Etoawah, North Carolina, will take time out to attend the series. He will speak on August 15. His topic will be "Charity Suffereth Long and Is Kind."

"Dr. Frank," as he is known here, will take leave of his duties as United Nations Representative for India and Pakistan in order to speak. The time and subject of his talk were not announced.

Other speakers in the series include Norman Thomas, Chairman, Post War World Council; Dr. Everett R. Clineby, President, National Conference of Christians and Jews; Dr. George E. Haynes, of the National Urban League; and Dr. Samuel Goldenson, Rabbi Emeritus of Temple Emanu-El, New York City.

Lieber's work: "Your idea of presenting in concise form some of the fundamental methods of modern mathematics I consider to be a very happy one, and I like immensely the way in which you have done it. These presentations are not only stimulating to the layman, but also will tend to counteract a too narrow specialization on the part of professional mathematicians, a specialization threatening to become a serious danger to the development of science."
