4,271 preregister at UNC Total enrollment mot definite

Raymond Strong, director of Records and Registration said that summer school enrollment for this year will probably not exceed last summer's enrollment.

Mr. Strong said 4,271 students have preregistered for the first session of summer school. "There may be 1,500 to 2,000 more people, but we'll have no way of knowing

The number of students attending the first session of summer school in 1973 was 6,394 and 5,411 attended the second session.

The first session is starting a week earlier than last year. Classes are to begin 8 a.m. today. "The schedule change should have some effect on enrollment," Strong said, "but a final figure won't be available for about three weeks.

"The law school and other graduate school students are yet to come in and some people will cancel, so it is hard to make a projection."

Norm Gustaveson only winner in May local primary election

Norm Gustaveson was the only outright winner in the May 7 Democratic primary for Orange County Commissioner. Gustaveson, the Director of the UNC YM-YWCA, received 5,281 votes. Only 40 per cent of the County's 24,000 Democrats voted.

The other two seats open on the Board this year will be filled in a runoff election to be held June 4. The

candidates in the June election and the votes they received May 7 are: Norman Walker (3,925), Melvin Whitifield 3,624), Tom Bacon (3,077) and Jan Pinney (3,027). Candidates needed 4,001 votes to avoid a runoff.

In the race for Orange County sheriff, Buck Knight defeated challenger Bill Ray by a 6,200 to 2,900 margin, winning 33 of the 35 precincts.

There will also be a runoff for State Senator. In the race for two seats, Charles Vickery (9, 102), Russell Walker

(9,075) and Carl Smith (8,955) will square off June 4. The other candidates, Joe Monroe and Benjamin Swalin, were

In the Republican race, Ed Tenney and Michael Budd won State Senate nominations.

All Orange County voters who registered by April 7 can vote in the June 4 runoff. They vote at their old polling place, even if they have moved since the May primary. Registered voters can vote in the runoff even if they did not vote May 7.

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
