5,550 students expected in second summer session

Five thousand five hundred and fifty students are expected to attend the second summer session. Five thousand four hundred and eleven attended the second summer session last year. Dr. Donald Tarbet, assistant director of Records and registration said exact enrollment would not be known for several days. Enrollment for the first session totaled 6,217. Twenty-one point five per cent of those enrolled are outof-state residents. About 10 per cent are visiting students.

About 450 courses in 36 departments and schools are being taught during the second session of summer school, which began Tuesday. The courses will be offered in seven professional programs and 29 dpeartments in the Arts and Sciences-General College

The second summer session is well staffed. Full professors and associate professors are scheduled to conduct classes in addition to several Kenan professors.

A short session, ending July 16, is being taught along with the regular summer session for students unable to complete the full session.

Final exams for the regular session are scheduled for Aug. 5 and 6.

Wednesday was the last day for adding courses. Students may drop courses until

one week before the last class day.

The University Housing Office should be able to accomodate all summer students seeking University housing for the summer. Connie Nelson, assistant director of housing contracts, said most summer housing arrangements have been made for the second summer session.

Stacy Dorm will be closed in anticipation of a smaller enrollment for the second session. Spaces are still available in Aycock. Graham, Kenan and Cobb dorms.

There are no men's single rooms available in the dorms. Single and doubel rooms are still available for women students. Nelson added that men students might be placed in the graduate center at Craige dormitory. provided they are at least 21.

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
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
