Examination was made three groups of students at the
University of Pennsylvania, the first group composed of 278 men, the second of 181 women, and the third of 220 men. It was found that forty-six per cent of the first group, thirty-two per cent of the second, and
thirty-five per cent of the third had athlete's foot.
Athlete's foot is a form of ringworm caused by a fungus which attacks the skin between the toes and causes blisters and the shedding of bits of skin. When these particles are shed in locker rooms, swimming pools, and gymnasiums they adhere to Many students do not know that they have athlete's foot and thus he possibilities of sprot and disease are increased.
The results of the survey led to a plea for strict examination of students in all colleges in order to prevent spread of the isease, and sterilization of colnasiums.
