ELECTION PARTY TO START AT 8 IN GRAHAM LOUNGE

Final Returns Will Be Posted On Blackboards

As the last signs of politicking leave the handbill-strewn campus, and the tense cry of "Who Won?" rings up from the quadrangles through the back rooms in Fraternity Row, a nervous crowd of campaigners and candidates will pack the main lounge of Graham Memorial tonight at 8 o'clock to witness the results of today's polling at the third annual DAILY TAR HEEL election party.

With choruses of "ah's" and "oh's," cheers, and soft murmurs filled with the pangs of disappointment echoing throughout the lounge, the results will come pouring in, precinct by precinct, to be announced over the public address system by a crack crew of DAILY TAR HEEL workers which is being furnished by Skipper Bowles, director of a campus orchestra. As each new set of figures is tabulated by Student council members, the returns will be posted on blackboards covering every phase of today's balloting.

STRICT SECRECY
Strict secrecy will shroud the returns until they are tabulated on the official DAILY TAR HEEL scoreboard. Stressing that the election party will be the only means of learning the results of elections, Managing Editor Morris Rosenberg said yesterday, "No returns will be given over the phone during the course of the evening. Everyone is invited to come, and, although Graham Memorial will be unable to serve refreshments, you can always bring your own. The blackboards will carry the official results, and no one except certain staff members will be allowed in the DAILY TAR HEEL office."

Tonight's party will be the third annual election celebration to be held by the DAILY TAR HEEL. Inaugurated by Charlie Gilmore, managing editor in 1938, the party for the past two years has served the campus with first hand news of the day's returns on election night.

Tonight's election party will begin at 8 o'clock and will extend far into the night, Managing Editor Rosenberg predicted yesterday. He explained that this year's tabulating would take longer than in previous years, since each individual precinct's voting will have to be added individually and the number of candidates running for each office has been greatly increased. Under the new law recently passed by the student legislature, the campus has been divided into four precincts, the YMCA, Woman's Dorm No. 1, Dormitory H, and Graham Memorial.

WASHINGTON, April 17 — Secretary of State Cordell Hull warns foreign nations that any intervention in the affairs of the rich Dutch East Indies' vast storehouse of vital United States raw materials "would be prejudicial to the cause of stability, peace, and security in the Pacific."

WASHINGTON — Dutch Minister Louden pledges on behalf of his country that no nation will be permitted to invade the Netherlands for "protective" purposes.

STOCKHOLM—German troops are reported to be moving toward Namsos for battle with British forces said to have landed there; German troops have cut Norway in two on the Trond-
