Elections Procedure

Second, the Elections committee, chairmaned by Bucky Harward, will introduce a bill establishing elections procedure. The bill will include: (1) the establishment of precincts-for town students in Graham Memorial; for lower quadrangle at H dormitory; for fraternities, Battle-Vance-Pettigrew, Old East, Old West, Steele, Carr, and L at the YMCA; and sororities and coed dorms at Dormitory No. 1; (1) a section prohibiting the posting of any campaign posters within the building housing the poll or the distribution of any literature inside the door of said building on the day of elections; and (3) a provision for the procurement of voting booths from the town of Chapel Hill, if such action is possible.


