The Di was opposed to the Jewish state in Palestine and felt that any discrimination because of religion is unjust.

Miss Guard declared that she will not be a candidate for reelection.

From there on out it was a question of how many points Carolina could run up.

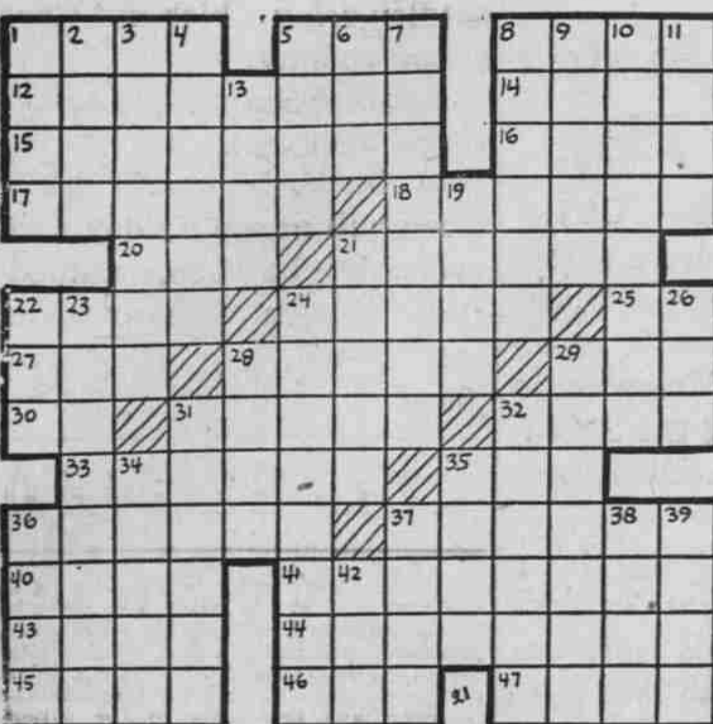
