Byrnes Urges UNO Council Send Queries

Red Delegate Absent From Private Session

UNO Headquarters, March 29.—Secretary of State Byrnes has urged the UNO Security Council to send formal inquiries to both Moscow and Tehran, asking whether Russia has placed a price on Red Army withdrawal from Iran. Byrnes suggests that Russia and Iran be given until next Tuesday to reply. Byrnes' plan received immediate support from Britain and from Poland, which hitherto has strongly supported the Russian position.

Secret Meeting

Delegates to the UNO Security Council met privately this afternoon, almost an hour before the formal public session. None of the delegates would discuss the purpose of the meeting. Russian delegate Andrei Gromyko was absent from that session, as well as from the public meeting.

Need For Navy Draft Nil After September

Washington, March 29.—The Chief of Navy personnel, Admiral Louis Denfield, says the Navy can get along with volunteers after September 1st. The Navy now gets 1100 men a month through Selective Service. The Admiral has told the Senate Military Affairs Committee the Navy hopes to reach its peacetime strength of 500,000 enlisted men by September 1st.

Former UNC Professor New Treasury Assistant

Washington, March 29.—Edward M. Bernstein of Chapel Hill, North Carolina, has been named Assistant to the Secretary of Treasury.

Bernstein, former professor of economics at the University of North Carolina, has been assistant director of the Treasury's Division of Monetary Research since 1941.

Bill Approved To Curb Music Czar Petrillo

Washington, March 29.—The House overwhelmingly has approved a bill to impose stiff Federal curbs on the demands of music czar Petrillo. With a vote of 186 to 16, the representatives have made it a penal offense for any person to try to force broadcasters to employ more people than he needs—to hire stand-by orchestras—or to refrain from broadcasting recordings.

Cancellation Called For Bomb Tests

Washington, March 29.—Senator Huffman of Ohio has introduced a resolution in Congress for a complete cancellation of the Bikini atomic bomb tests.

Chiang Kai-Shek Given Highest US Decoration

Chungking, March 29.—Chinese Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek has been awarded the highest decoration which America can bestow on a citizen of another country—the Distinguished Service Medal. The award was made by the American commander in China—Lieutenant General Wedemyer.

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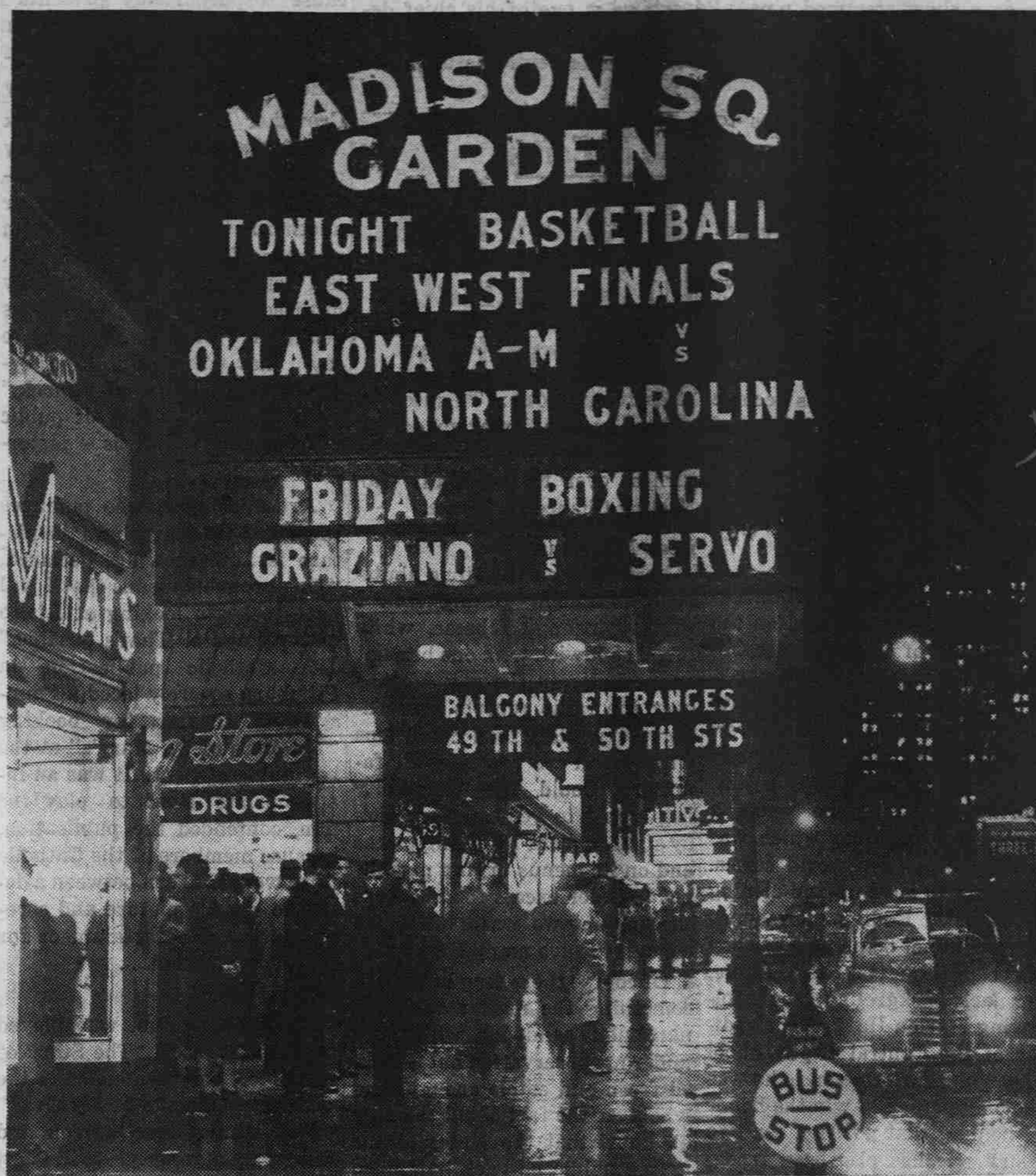

Bluebeard Landru, greatest criminal of the century until the war, ended his career on the guillotine because of a single flaw in his criminal makeup—his passion for exactitude in keeping records.

One of the principal items of evidence against Landru, who specialized in the murder of women, was a notation in his notebook of having purchased two railway tickets from Paris to a town near the woods of Gambais, where he owned an isolated dwelling, and a related notation that he had purchased only one ticket for the return trip. Fraternities Subject Of Monday Work Shop

The Pan-Hellenic Council will sponsor a work shop Monday night, April 1, at 7:30 o'clock in the main lounge of Graham Memorial. The program is for all sorority women.

Two topics of discussion will comprise the program. Twig Branch will lead a discussion on "Interfraternity Cooperation." Meadie Montgomery will talk on the "Contribution of Fraternities to the Enrichment of College Life." After the main discussions, there will be three small group discussions for the president, pledge trainer, and rush captain of each sorority. These discussions will be under the leadership of Joyce Fowler, Snookie Phipps and Lou Hall.

Sallie Robertson, Chi Omega, will head the Pan-Hellenic Council for next year. Other officers are: Penny Durham, vice-president, ADPI; Cathie Carlen, secretary, Tri Delta; Mac Cushman, treasurer, Alpha Gam, and Sibyl Goerch, representative to legislature, Pi Phi.

The rest of the council will be composed of the president and rush chairman of each of the five sororities and two representatives from the Stray Greeks. Pi Phi members will be Anne Cutts and Marion Stoudemire. Tri Delta representatives will be Jeanne Drisoll and Dot Swain. Fran Satterfield and Kit Coleman are the Chi Omega delegates. Robin Lear and Caroline Hall will be the Alpha Gam members, and Anne Tremble and Dot Dashiell will represent ADPI.

Betty Lou Cypert, Dora Winters and Marion Saunders are back on the campus this weekend and visiting at the Pi Phi house.

Mr. Hardre and Mrs. Huse will teach conversation courses, Professor Giduz will teach French grammar and materials and methods for teaching French, and Mr. Hardre will give a course in French civilization.

There will be evening lectures, motion pictures and entertainments of various kinds.

The French government was so interested in this project which began last year that it has granted a scholarship for this year. Last summer three proficiency awards consisting of books, were presented by the French government.

Prof. Hugo Giduz of the University Department of Romance Languages, will serve as director again, and Mrs. Charlotte V. Huse, assistant director. Both, along with Jacques Hardre, University instructor of French, will instruct the students. Miss Virginia Allen of the Charlotte Central High School will assist in the House as a personal advisor to the students.

Graduates May Enroll

Graduate students who wish to continue their studies in the Department of Romance Languages may also enroll, Professor Giduz said. Others, with sufficient knowledge of French, who wish to improve their knowledge of both the spoken and written language, may enroll.

French will be the exclusive language of the House, in which women students will have rooms. Meals will be served in the House for both men and women.

The number of students who can be accommodated is limited and applications should be made by May 15 when acceptance will be made in the order in which they are received, Professor Giduz said.

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Baptist Students Open Membership Drive Tomorrow

Baptist students will begin a membership drive with a luncheon in the church basement tomorrow noon followed by a canvass of dormitories and student residences in town. With the coming of a full time student chaplain members of the Baptist Student Union hope to enlarge the scope of their program to include as many as possible of the approximately one thousand Baptist students here.
